OUR FLAG.—It is there! The JOURNAL presents a handsome illustrated page, and turn, with pleasure from our late legislature to the Father of Our Country. In the kindergarten school all over our land the little tots devote the day to a study of George Washington. They are taught to revere his noble memory and honor the flag. We wish there were a law requiring pupils in all our public schools to do the same. The flag is flying over the state house, the state institutions, Willamette university and public schools that have a flag. Our dispatches show that the president of our country went on a special train from Washington to New York to behold two great ocean steamships haul down the flag of Great Britain and run up the American colors. We salute the flag. Three cheers for George Washington and the Red, White and Blue.

THE ALUMNI FUND.—The meeting at Willamette university to create an alumni fund of \$5,000 for the library, laboratory and museum has been productive of much good. The addresses by President Whitaker and Prof. Hawley were of a high type and we cannot but feel that if the people of the northwest, and of the Methodist church, knew the men now on the faculty of this university they would be prepared to give it grand support and every needed sacrifice. Two subscriptions of \$50 each were secured and others are prepared to give. The promise of the alumni to come to the rescue of this school should be redeemed with a shining roll of honor.

STILL COMMISSIONER.—W. W. Baker is still state food commissioner. The legislature elected Charles Holman, a son of Captain Charles Holman, under the new law, to be state food and dairy commissioner for two years. A bill repealing the old law under which Holman was elected, was filed with the secretary of state last night, so there is a vacancy, and the old state food commissioner probably holds over according to the constitution, until his successor is appointed. If Mr. Holman had been elected under the new law after going into effect, or had been named in the bill he would be in for a term of two years. As it is he is out.

HEARD FROM.—Geo. W. Johnson, administrator of the deceased Saxton Williams, received a telegram from the dead man's brother in Michigan this morning, ordering him to hold the remains for his arrival, he having started Monday for Oregon. The body is being embalmed at the Olinger & Rigdon undertaking parlor and can easily be preserved for that length of time.

COURTS.—In the county court G. W. Johnson was appointed administrator of the estate of Saxton C. Williams, who died suddenly at Mrs. McCauley's lodging house on Front street. Peter Stokes and Walter Young, two deck hands on the steamer Hong, who raised a drunken row in a saloon, got sixty and sixty-five days in the county jail, at the hands of Recorder Edes.

NEW SCHOOL LAW.—Salem comes under the jurisdiction of a new school law which makes cities of four thousand or over, one independent district, which must have five directors, who elect their own clerk and are authorized to incur a debt of not to exceed \$100,000. The act takes effect, by a special emergency clause, on the first day of March this year. Under this law Salem district will have three directors to elect.
