non, Mo., paper we copy this item: It
is understood that C. R. Carter has em-
ployed A. L. Thomas, of Carthage, to
look after his interests. The status of
the case is this: He has been tried and
convicted of murder in the first degree.
He was duly sentenced by the circuit
judge of the court of this county and
took an appeal. Pending his appeal in
the supreme court and before there was
a hearing before that tribunal he es-
caped. When his case was reached the
supreme court gave notice that unless
he gave himself up to the sheriff of
Lawrence county by a certain date his
appeal would be dismissed, which was
subsequently done and the judgment
affirmed, and the matter now seems
alone within the jurisdiction of the
circuit court of this county. It appears
to be the opinion of those qualified to
know that the procedure will be for
Judge Robinson to fix the date for car-
rying into effect the sentence of the
court, but what action will finally be

PUBLIC SCHOOLS EXHIBIT.

Salem Pupils and Teachers Contribute
to the World's Fair.The teachers and pupils of the Salem
public schools have for several weeks
been contributing of their spare mo-
ments to the preparation of a very in-
teresting exhibit to be sent to the Chi-
cago world's fair as a part of Oregon's
display.

THIS AFTERNOON

the exhibit was got together from the
various schools of the city and arranged
on a large scale in the central hall on
the second floor. Forty-three sheets of
cardboard were covered, one or more
from each grade of the city schools.
There are representations in geography
as follows:A product map of Oregon occupies the
center and on it are displayed in
appropriate position the products of all
parts of the state.The Willamette, Snake and Rogue
river valleys are the home of fruits.
Southeastern Oregon is an arid moun-
tainous region typified by grasses, bear
claws and rattlesnake rattles. In the
center of the state the fertile valleys of
the John Day and Des Chutes show
the grain and wool products of the
great inland empire. The Pacific coast
region is shown with its products of
fisheries, shellfish, mosses, etc.The state is shown to be all dotted
over with mineral products. There
are excellent outline, relief, climatic,
animal zone, and grand division maps
of the continent.There is an historical exhibit show-
ing the French and Indian wars, the
civil war, and a battle map of the con-
tinental war. Charts in physiology re-
present the stomach, eye and ear, and
heart.The little tots of the second grade
produced a map of Salem. Kindergarten
work—or the busy work of the pri-
mary department is shown in paper
folding, (this shows where the whole
exhibit comes from) spelling out "Salem,
Oregon," in big letters. Designing
and drawing is shown in some very
practical original designs for wall paper
borders.

THE EXHIBIT

was planned by Mrs. S. G. Grubbe,
City Supt. of Schools, and carried out
in detail by the following teachers:
Mr. Whipple, Miss Morrison, Miss Mc-
Kinley, Miss Frink, Miss Ada Reynolds,
Miss Gwynne, Mr. Matthews, Miss
Capwell, Miss Theiss, Miss Van Wan-
der, Miss Peabees, Mr. Anderson, Mr.
Loug, Mrs. Dodd, Miss Hibbard, Miss
Coburn, Miss Brehaut.The work was exhibited all this after-
noon and will be packed Friday for
shipment to Supt. Pratt of Portland,
who has charge of collecting the Ore-
gon public school exhibit.
