THE GOVERNOR VETOES

Durham Ballot Law—No Artesian
Wells—Game Warden
Killed.

Governor Penney Thursday night
closed his critical inspection of the acts
of the last legislature and filed vetoes
of seven bills.

He vetoes Senate bill 55, the same
being enacted in House bill 154 filed.
Also House bill 189, duplicate of Sen-
ate bill 88.

THE DURHAM BALLOT BILL.

He says: "House bill No. 175, amend-
ment of the election law, is herewith
returned with my disapproval. The
present election law has only been in
operation for the last two years. It has
secured that every citizen should de-
sire, the secrecy and sanctity of the bal-
lot. The citizens of Oregon have become
familiar with its provisions, and objec-
tions plausible at the time of its enact-
ment are fruitless now after a successful
trial. Although doubtless not intended
the effect of the change proposed by the
bill would be to destroy, in a measure,
this secrecy of the ballot, and to afford
an opportunity for vote-buying. The
result, it is most certain, would be de-
sired neither by the legislature, nor the
people, I therefore veto the bill."

HE VETOES HOUSE BILL NO. 205, FOR EXPERIMENTS IN SINKING ARTESIAN WELLS IN ARID LANDS.

THE WARDEN GOES.

To the house of Representatives: "I
herewith return house bill No. 110 with
my dissent. The purpose of this bill is
similar to senate bill 108, already filed.
Both provide for the protection of game
and fish, but, while the senate bill pro-
vides for the election of a game and
fish protector by the legislative assem-
bly, the house bill provides for his se-
lection by a commission thus elected.
The legislature by the provision of
the house bill would thus be delegating
to a commission the right to select an
officer to enforce state laws, a right
which it is doubtful if it possesses
itself, but which, if it possessed, it has
no authority to delegate to others.
This is a most unwarranted departure
from the true spirit of the constitution,
which compels the governor to make
oath that he shall take care that the
laws be faithfully executed, and which
therefore confers upon him, instead of
upon the legislature or upon a commis-
sion not recognized by the constitution,
the appointment of all officers for the
enforcement of state laws. I veto the
bill."

He also vetoes house bill 103. Among
objections it is stated: "If this bill be
passed, it permits the lender to im-
pose such terms as he may see fit, as a
condition precedent to lending his
money, and would enable him to sell
the property of his debtor summarily
and deprive him of his home with-
out other notice than that contained
in the deed of trust or mortgage. Un-
der the law as it now stands, every
man has his day in court, but the bill
returned herewith deprives him of that
right, if his pressing needs should ever
induce him to execute such an instru-
ment as is permitted to be framed
thereunder."
