End of the Long-Winded Cook Trials

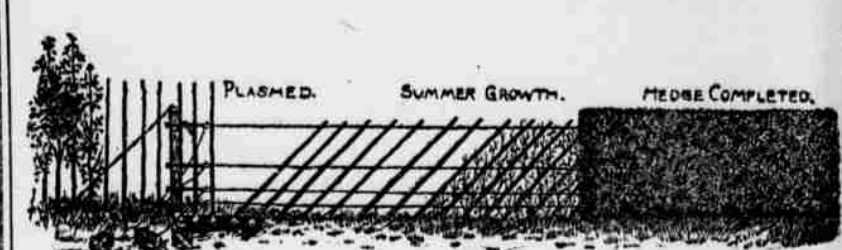
