LEAGUE BASEBALL.—Another effort should be made to secure league baseball for Salem this season. The Oregonian says: If Salem can be induced to organize and maintain a professional baseball club, the Pacific Northwest league may be reorganized before the season opens. Seattle, Tacoma and Portland are eager to play ball, and if a four-club league can be established there would be no difficulty in getting good players at reasonable prices. For the first time in 10 years the Eastern union leagues have got salaries down to a basis where there is a chance for them to live through the season and have a little remuneration for their trouble. Men are now under contract at \$90 a month, who would not have looked at anything less than \$300 a month a few years ago. High salaries was the Jonah of the Pacific Northwest league last season. It is to be hoped that this showing will induce Salem to enter the field.

ROBERT E. BYBEE DEAD.

The Well-Known Salem Horseman Dies at Oakland, Cal.

Robert E. Bybee, the well-known horseman, died Saturday at Oakland, Cal., where he was attending a race meeting. A telegram from the deceased's father, stating that he would start with the remains Sunday was the first intimation received by Mrs. Bybee, who resides at Portland.

Few men in the Willamette valley enjoyed a wider range of acquaintance than Robert E. Bybee. When only 2 years old he accompanied his parents to this state, and he has resided here ever since. The aged father who survives him was the first man in Oregon to breed and train running horses, and to that business the son's life was devoted. He was a familiar figure on every racetrack in the northwest. Four months ago he took three of his best horses, Misty Morn, Rosebud and Broadburch, to California, and won some good purses with them. A report that he was seriously ill reached this city recently, but it was subsequently contradicted. The cause of death is not stated in the telegram received by the widow, but it is believed that he succumbed to a heart affection that had troubled him for a long time. A widow, daughter, a father and three sisters are the deceased horseman's nearest living relatives. He leaves considerable property, among it being a valuable stock farm near this city.

The meeting of old students and alumni, held Feb. 20th, to consider plans for aiding the university, adopted resolutions and appointed committees to secure a fund of \$5000, by subscriptions, of any amount, and the said fund to be named by the person giving the largest sum, providing such sum is at least \$500. The committee will correspond with all old students and Alumni and secure such aid as each may contribute. No part of this fund, either interest or principle, is to be expended, until it reaches \$25,000. Misses Minnie Cunningham and Mary Reynolds started the fund with 50 cents each.

President Whitaker attended the meeting of college presidents at Portland, Tuesday. The aim of the meeting was to promote fraternal regard, raise the standard of required work and systematize the work of higher education in Oregon.
