A Convict Whose Wife Has Gone
Astray.

Walter White was a drunkard and went to Coos Bay, where he worked in a logging camp and became engaged to a young woman, was married and they had a child which died of diphtheria. He had before this kept sober, but the blow upset him, and he got drunk, forged a check, returned part of the money when he got sober and realized what he had done, but was indicted and convicted. Word now comes to the governor that Walter White's wife loves another and the governor is anxiously investigating the case in the hope that something may be done to save the family. THE PAID FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Comparison of Expenses Under the
Two Ordinances.

The old Salem fire department has been virtually done away with. No. 3, the old North Salem hand engine company, and the Alert Hook & Ladder Co. No. 1, are repealed by the new ordinance. The allowances and salaries of the old department amounted to \$340 a month without incidental expenses. The new paid department consists of a chief engineer at \$75 a month, engineer of fire engine \$75 a month, second engineer \$50, driver of engine \$50, driver of hose wagon \$50, salary of eight hose men at ten dollars each, \$80. This makes a total of \$370 a month. This secured the services of thirteen men ready to do duty on top of the bell, and a force sufficient to fight any ordinary fire that may break out.

SOME OF THE NEW LAWS.

STOCK BRANDS

Requires that all brands shall be recorded in county where owner resides, and where stock usually ranges, by setting forth or describing a fac simile of the brand, designating the place on the animal where it is to be used, and deliver to clerk brand burned upon a piece of leather, and from date of filing shall have exclusive use of such brand. Stock may be marked by cutting, notching or chipping the ear, but not cut off more than half of the same, nor by cutting off ear on both sides to a point. In effect May 15.

PAYMENT OF LABORERS BY RECEIVERS. Where business or property of a person, corporation or company is put in hands of a receiver, same shall report the amount due laborers or employees and court must order receiver to pay out of first receipts, after paying operating expenses, all wages earned six months prior to appointment of receiver.

Should such receiver not take in enough money to pay such labor, he shall at least once in thirty days issue a receivers certificate, which shall draw interest at 8 per cent. and be paid out of first earnings. In effect.

TRESPASS ACT.

There will be in effect May 15th next an act making it a misdemeanor for any person other than an officer on lawful business being armed with a gun pistol or firearm of any kind to go or trespass upon any enclosed premises or lands without the consent of the owner or person in possession. It is also made unlawful to shoot upon or from the public highways, or for any person armed with a firearm to cause, permit or suffer any dog accompanying such person to go or enter upon any enclosed premises without the consent of the owner, but not to apply to dogs in pursuit of deer or varmints.

TRAIN WRECKERS.

A law is in effect to make it a penitentiary offence to tear up or obstruct railway tracks so as to endanger any train or lives of passengers.

CHattel MORTGAGES. not accompanied by actual and immediate delivery of the property shall be void as against subsequent purchasers and mortgages in good faith unless within five days after execution it shall be filed with the county clerk for record. In effect May 17th.

SALARIES

Of county assessors at \$3.00 a day except in counties east of Cascade mountains and Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Tillamook, Clatsop, Clatsop and Marion where they are to receive \$4.00 a day. Multnomah county \$6.00 a day. Commissioners of counties \$3.00 a day except Douglas, Lake, Klamath, Jackson, Yamhill and Gilliam, where they get \$4.00 a day. Union county \$6.00. In effect May 17th.

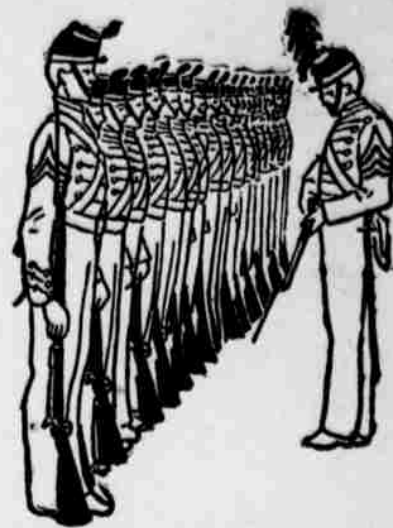
