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MARRIED TEACHERS.

The Tacoma school board has made itself ridiculous by adopting a rule stating that "the position of any teacher marrying during the continuance of her contract with the board shall thereby become void."

If the idea were that the teacher should suspend work during the honeymoon it would be proper. Because as soon as she (or he) got over the first excitement of matrimony she (or he) would be just as well qualified to teach as ever.

This resolution is aimed at women, and the idea is that a married man may teach school but a married woman may not. It is false, erroneous and unjust.

If a man or woman have equipped themselves for teaching, and are really competent educators, the fact of marriage is not a disqualification.

A sensible married woman is far more likely to be fit to teach than a young woman who is only teaching until an opportunity to marry is offered. There is no person more unfit to teach than a silly, giggling, lovesick girl not yet out of her teens, (the Backlash as the Germans call them) and that many of this class are employed to form the minds of our youth in the public schools no one can deny, take the whole country over.

In this city several of the best teachers ever employed in the public schools have been married ladies. The main argument for employing women as teachers will not permit married women to be ruled out, and that is, the women carry the atmosphere and influence of the home into their school work. Refinement is taught children by the presence and contact of a woman. It certainly is more felt in the person of a woman who manages a home than in one who merely boards around. As a rule when women teachers marry they cease to teach. But their marriage does not render them unfit to be educators.

DECLINE OF SALOONS.

It is a well known fact that not all the saloons in Salem are making money. It is difficult to find a location where a saloon will pay big rent and not its bills. The saloon men here say the drug stores and restaurants take the best of the drink trade and leave them mostly the drunks, bums, and deadbeats. There may be some truth in this.

The report made by the License Collector of Portland, to the effect that since the beginning of the last quarter over 20 retail liquor establishments have closed their doors in that city, has caused considerable comment by people engaged in that line of business. The general opinion is that the saloon business is overdone in Portland, and the city could easily spare several more establishments. A prominent wholesaler said to an Oregonian reporter in referring to the matter,

THE MILLER'S COMBINE.

"I am not at all sorry to see these saloons close up. The fact is, business is so dull in this line that it makes it hard on the wholesale dealers. We have to carry these people and it is almost impossible to get money out of them. I have now on my book accounts amounting to several thousand dollars, and it is doubtful if I ever get half of it. I grow tired of feeding this people and would like to see many more go out of business."

A combination of flour millers has been formed at the Portland meeting held last week. It will incorporate under the name of the Northwest Flour and Shipping Company. The milling firms concerned comprise about one-half of the concerns now represented in the Oregon and Washington Millers' Association, which was in session at St. Charles during two days. For the present the new company will capitalize for \$20,000. The 20 mills represented have a capacity of about 2000 barrels daily. It is proposed to erect a warehouse in Portland at once, and to send out agents to dispose of the products of the mills which will be stored here. The officers of the new company are A. J. McDaniel of Portland, president; E. P. McDaniel, of Cove, vice-president; W. S. Hurst, of Aurora, secretary and treasurer; A. J. McDaniel, E. P. McDaniel, John Miln, J. C. Long and W. S. Hurst, board of directors. The new company will not in any effect the old association, which will continue as formerly.

AN ELOQUENT ILLUSTRATION.

During his closing address at Lafayette, Or., recently, Col. Stevenson the temperance lecturer, said: "I saw the rock while at Niagara, upon which

As there is no provision of the constitution that prohibits calling things by their right names, we presume there is no sanctity that surrounds even a legislature. The number of just such persons as the writer of the above in the last legislature made it what was, a body of men, a majority of whom held themselves responsible to no one.

If the press and the people cannot discuss their legislature, what power can hold that branch of our government in check. In a certain sense its only limits are the constitution. But those limits can only be declared by the supreme court, and the ordinary citizen has no redress. A legislature is properly subject to discussion and we propose to discuss it when there is any occasion. The people have no other protection against the arrogance and extravagance of this body of lawmakers.

An Electric Storage Steamer.

TACOMA, March 16.—The Point Defiance, Tacoma, and Edison Street railway company thinks it has solved the problem of passenger traffic in small steamers, and is to put an electric storage battery steamer named Mount Tacoma on the route between the end of its line, Gig Harbor, and the floating dry dock at quartermaster harbor. The steamer will be launched in July. She will be fifty-six feet over all, ten feet wide, and five feet deep. The motive power is seventy-five cells battery, which will also be used for ballast and will be charged from the electric railway trolley wire. It is calculated to run twelve hours at a speed of fifteen miles per hour. It will seat 150 people. Only two similar steamers in existence, both smaller, one in New York, the other in San Francisco. Nick Lawson, superintendent of Point Defiance railway, is the inventor.

Clarkson For a Fight.

NEW YORK, March 16.—The executive committee of the national Republican league closed a three days' session at the Plaza hotel. A sub-executive committee of the national league was appointed today and made up as follows: President, James S. Clarkson, ex-officio; James A. Blanchard, New York, chairman; A. B. Humphrey, New York, secretary; J. H. Manley, Maine. Representatives will attend the convention from all the important states, from Maine to California. President Clarkson said: "The correspondence of the league shows the blood of the party is up and ready to fight. The prospects for a large attendance at Louisville are good, and Louisville people are making ready to give the visiting Republicans a Kentucky welcome."

A Murderous Servant.

MADRID, March 16.—A trusted man servant in the employ of Countess Gomar, one of the old Grandee families, for an unknown cause attempted to murder her, and also shot a maid servant who came to her assistance. He then turned the revolver on himself. The assassin is dead, but the countess and maid may recover.

Snakes Do Not Bite.

A popular error is the supposition that a snake bites. Probably no creature in the world provided with teeth and jaws has so little power of biting. The jaws are not hinged, but are attached one to the other by cartilage. Thus a snake can have no leverage in opposing one jaw to the other, and could not in this manner pierce the skin. The fangs are driven into the flesh by a stroke, not by a bite. A snake is harmless unless in coil. From its coil it throws its head and body forward and strikes or hooks its fangs into the object aimed at. The entire work is done with the upper jaw, the lower jaw having nothing at all to do with it. A man striking a boat hook into a pier furnishes an example of the way in which a snake strikes. Biting is a physical impossibility.—New Orleans Times-Democrat.
