THE VINEGAR CO.—A reporter saw
one of the officers of the Pacific Vinegar
Co., of Portland at the train this
morning. That company consolidated
with the Portland Preserving works
and the Western Vinegar Co. less than
a year ago. Soon the suspicions of
some of the new company were aroused
by an effort to issue fraudulent stock.
At the first attempt to vote the president,
Gild Stolz, ruled it out, as the
laws of this state give the president of
a corporation full power to do. The
courts were resorted to in order to compel
Mr. Stolz to recognize the watered
vinegar stock. The case comes up
again Wednesday at 9 a. m. A suit in
equity is also pending which will bring
up the whole matter on its merits.

seems to be on Meek's side, not that he
is considered a better shot than Martin,
but owing to the fact of his being a much
older, and consequently more experienced
trap shot. No one locally seems
willing to pick the winner for money,
but undoubtedly there will be more or
less money change hands, as the Albany
boys feel confident of their man being
successful, while the McMinnville
shooters undoubtedly feel the same.
Mr. Martin is a comparatively new
shooter, so to speak, but since indulging
in the manly sport of trap shooting,

ABOUT RELIGIOUS MATTERS.

**A Divine Upon the Public and Par-
ochial Schools.**

JERSEY CITY, March 20.—The Rev.
John L. Schudder, of Jersey City's
tabernacle, last night preached on the
subject of parochial schools, in con-
nection with the bill recently intro-
duced into New Jersey's legislature.
In part he said:

"The public school is the foundation
of American liberty, and any man
who tries to undermine it is a traitor to
his country and an enemy of free peo-
ple. Our system of popular education
is the pride and glory of the nation,
and every loyal American will uphold
it with all the energy in his being. To
surrender our national birthright to
sectarian prejudice, or to compromise
with the insidious priesthood would be
the height of cowardice and the fore-
runner of oppression. I am glad to see
this issue coming to the front so rapidly.
We might as well settle it now once
for all, and save an endless amount of
bitterness and sectarian strife."

Trainrobber Hanged From a Gate.
JELICO, Tenn., March 20.—At mid-
night last night Jailer Irwin was called
to the door of his residence. He looked
out upon a courtyard full of determined
men with rifles. The leaders at once covered
him with rifles. They demanded that he
unfasten the doors and lead them to
Jesse Jones, whose attempted arrest
yesterday led to the shooting of Sheriff
Burnett. The jailer obeyed orders and
soon Jones was brought forth. He was
taken to the barnyard of Rev. J. S.
Lindley. Before an old time beam came
mounted the gallow and placed the
rope over the top beam. Jones was
throughout very collected. Asked if he
had anything to say, he denied having
any connection with the affair. He
was then drawn up and the rope made
fast, when the mob quickly dispersed.
