A Former Salem Business Man Expires at Portland.

The telegraph brought intelligence of the death this morning at 8 a. m. of Louis Kuhn at his present home in Portland, where he has resided in the residence of his brother-in-law, J. Lowenberg of that city since last January. He was a resident of Salem the past ten years, where he was engaged as business manager of the Northwest foundry, which employed convict labor at the state prison. Mr. Kuhn has been ailing from bronchial troubles, and was in Salem last a few days, before the legislature closed as a witness in the prison investigation. He leaves a fine residence on Court street and other property, was a stockholder in the Capital City street railway, was a member of the Masonic order and very popular with a large circle of friends. He was about forty-five years old.

Shall the Schools Close?

SALEM, March 29, 1893.
No. 24.

Your directors have had a conference with the bankers of Salem, and find that they can borrow money sufficient to carry on the schools of this district until the taxes of 1893 are paid in, or until April 1, 1894. Provided, That at the election for voting school bonds, now advertised, the vote of the district shall be against bonding the district for the two new school houses. If bonds are voted for the new buildings, not only will all the schools be closed, at once, for one year, but the district will lose some \$13,000, money from the common school fund, and litigation on the contracts of all the teachers will probably be commenced. Besides, if the schools are closed, it is questionable whether the school tax for this year could be legally collected, and 1894 would find the district further embarrassed than now.

The reason for this state of affairs is, that if the bonds are voted, the district will have so nearly absorbed its limit of indebtedness by the building of the school houses, that no sufficient sum of money can be legally obtained for the conduct of the schools.

If you desire the schools continued, vote "Bonds No."

If you wish the new buildings erected, and the schools closed for 13 months, with all the chances in favor of their being indefinitely closed, vote "Bonds Yes."

It is with great reluctance that your directors make this public statement, but as the continuance of your public schools depend upon it, we have thought it to be our duty to the district to give a plain statement of facts.
