HUMANESOCIETY.—At the annual meeting of the Portland society the Humane officers' reports show the following: Inspected teams engaged in grading and excavating, times, 2830; cases of unnecessary whipping of horses, 70; cases of cruel abandonment of horses, 38; cases of underfed cattle, 11; cases of underfed horses and mules, 65; cases of unnecessary exposure of horses to storm, 257; cases of overloading teams, 85; cases of overdriven teams, 44; cases of horses and mules with galled shoulders, 107; horses being worked when insufficiently shod, 577; horses kept in filthy barns, 21; cattle kept in filthy barns, 4; dogs left in pain by street car accidents, 48; number of horses shot, 34; cases of poultry cruelly confined, 58; total number of horses taken from work for various causes, 749; total number of prosecutions, 31; total number of acquittals, 24; total amount of fines, \$560. The Salem society which has done a great deal of good in this city should be called together as it is time for its annual meeting.

A GRAVEL ROAD.—F. G. McClench, of Lincoln, was in the city yesterday and reports that a healthy movement is on foot to gravel the road between Salem and McMinnville. It is being pushed by such men as A. C. Forest and Jos. Kirkwood, of Wheatland, and the Polk county court will render assistance at once. It is proposed to take advantage of the new state law, and give the people of that county the benefit of 25 miles of first-class road. This will be of more benefit to the farmers of Polk county than a motor line, or any other investment they could make.

THE REVIVALISTS.—Messrs. Bell and Arne, the revivalists, will begin a series of meetings at the First M. E. church at 7:30 this evening. They are very successful evangelists and have been very successful in their work wherever they have appeared. THE SUMMER SCHEDULE.

Capital City Railway Company Puts its Men on Shorter Hours and Extends its Time Card.

Manager Anson of the Capital City street railway company has today completed an arrangement that will be very satisfactory to his men and very gratifying to the public. Several changes are made to take effect Saturday, April 1st, and are as follows:

SHORTER TIME.
From and after that date car men will work only eleven and one-half hours instead of sixteen. The compensation will be some less, but the details of the pay are mutually agreeable to the employees and the corporation. Nearly half as many more men will be required.

LONGER SERVICE.
Two hours and forty minutes longer car service will be maintained during the summer at least, and permanently if it is justified by the patronage. The earliest car will leave hotel Willamette and Post Office at five a. m. and make the overland fast mail train. Cars will leave that point regularly every twenty minutes for all terminal points from six twenty a. m. until eleven p. m., running an hour and twenty minutes later than at present, and enabling patrons of the line attending theaters, entertainments, parties or lodge to get a late car home. The cemetery car alone will be taken off to make trains.

AN EXPERIMENT.
The summer schedule is an experiment and if the public appreciate the extended service sufficiently to patronize it, there is no doubt but what it will be made permanent. No city of the size of Salem can boast of a better street car system, and the Capital City line is to be congratulated upon its very marked enterprise in rendering a metropolitan service.

THE UNFORTUNATE LILLIE.

Badly Bruised With a Bottle of Vile Whiskey.

The unfortunate Lillie King who has figured a great deal in Salem police court was complainant in an assault and battery case this morning. She has been out of the asylum for only a few weeks and showed a lump as big as an emblem goose egg on the side of her head.

What We Owe to Fire.

It is worth while to note how few of the things, besides the fire on the hearth, that go to make up a modern fireside could ever have come into being except through the agency of the fire. Trace the origin of the book you have been reading in your cozy corner of the hearth. Speech itself is partly a growth and partly an invention, but were not so familiar with them we should bow our heads in awe in the presence of these wondrous arbitrary characters we call the letters of the alphabet, by means of which we represent thought and speech, so that ideas are preserved age after age. We look at these characters and straightway in our minds are reproduced the speculations of Plato, the poetical imaginings of Virgil or the teachings of Jesus.

Through picture writing, hieroglyph, such figures as children play with and call the rebus; by steps like these—and the steps were many centuries—the race climbed to the attainment of a phonetic alphabet. Then many centuries still passed by, until at last, after the beneficent fire had helped men smelt and shape the stubborn iron the movable type was invented, and all the thoughts of the world are the common property of any who will learn to read. Measure the distance from the hut of the barbarian to the fireside of a modern home, and you measure the total advance that man has made in civilization.—Rev. M. J. Savage in Peterson's Magazine.

London's Paupers and Criminals.
On Jan. 1, 1891, the paupers in London numbered 112,547, and the cost of pauperism was in 1889-90, £2,340,000, the cost of each pauper being £21 16s. 1d.

The number of persons committed for trial during 1889-90 was 2,906, while 109,748 were convicted summarily. The habitual offenders known to the police not committed during the year numbered 2,392. The total represents a percentage of 2.7 to the whole population. The cost of the police was £1,799,000, or £15 12s. 9d. per head of the incriminated class. Industrial schools cost £20,652.—Fall Mail Gazette.
