CITY HALL FINANCIERING.

How Much Means the City Probably Has to Expend.

THE JOURNAL has treated the proposed building of a new city hall in a conservative manner and has indulged in no premature booming of plans. This much seems certain, if it is to be built, most careful financiering will be required.

Here is the situation: The city has, first, the proceeds of sale of the Capital Engine Co. property; 2d, it can issue bonds under its new charter; 3d, it has an income from licenses, fines, etc., 4th, a lot has been bought, and 5th, current expenses will have to be met. Here then is the balance sheet of assets in view of erecting a city hall:

That would leave exactly \$5000 to make a first payment on the city hall building. It is understood that no tax can be levied or collected for 1893. In this respect the city is in exactly the same condition as the school district.

Mayor Gatch opposed sale of the Capital Engine property and buying the lot for the new city hall, but says now that the council has taken the first steps, it should go ahead on the above basis, which was outlined to a JOURNAL writer, after a consultation with Chairman Hunt of the Ways and Means committee.

Mayor Gatch says there will be no trouble in floating the bonds at par, as there are frequent inquiries by purchasers of such securities. The outlook at present is that a new city hall will at least begin this year.

THE HERO RICHARDSON.

Three Thousand Reward Offered for the Capture of the Train Wreckers.

Nothing new has been demonstrated in the Yonocolla train wrecking case. The Portland press has not been able to add anything to the complete story of the wreck in the JOURNAL the day it occurred.

REWARD OFFERED.—The Southern Pacific offer a reward of \$3000 each for the arrest and conviction of the persons who removed the rail from the track Thursday night, for the purpose of wrecking the north-bound passenger train. The company has a well-organized posse at the scene looking up the matter, and it is thought there are several clues which may lead to the arrest of the guilty parties. The company will spare no pains nor expense in ferreting out the matter and in bringing the guilty persons to just punishment.

Superintendent Fields says that the railroad company has as yet taken no steps regarding the question of compensating George E. Richardson through whose heroic efforts a fearful wreck was averted and many human lives saved. He spoke in very high terms of Richardson's noble act, and said that the question of suitably rewarding him would be duly considered by the railroad company.

THE YONOCOLA WRECK.

Few Details Left to Be Made Public.

THE JOURNAL's account of the attempted train wrecking at Yonocolla was so complete a piece of newspaper work that not even the Portland papers, where the train stopped and every facility obtainable was at their hands, had as accurate and readable a report. But few details remain to be told.

A WILD REGION.
The scene of the atrocity is one of the wildest parts of the whole road, and if the train had been wrecked all, or nearly all, would have been burned alive. The trestle crosses a gully about 50 feet deep, with very steep sides. Had the train gone down in that gully, the cars would have tumbled one on top of the other, and those who were not killed in the fall would have been burned to death. The entire surrounding country is a mountainous, wild region, the ideal spot for train-robbers to operate.

TREASURE ABOARD.

Had the robbers been successful in carrying out their designs they would have secured a large amount of booty, as it is reported on good authority that Wells, Fargo & Co.'s treasure box contained \$35,000 in gold alone, shipped from San Francisco to a Portland bank, while other sums in the box brought the sum up to nearly \$50,000. In addition to this, one passenger had several thousand dollars in bills in his pocketbook, which, added to the pocket money and jewelry possessed by the numerous passengers, would have swelled the booty to a very large sum.

RESOLUTIONS OF THANKS.

The following resolutions of thanks were drawn up and signed by the passengers:
ON BOARD S. P. PASSENGER TRAIN No. 15, March 30, 1893.—Whereas, It has been the great and good fortune of the passengers on this train to escape instant death or horrible mutilation through the wrecking of the train on a high trestle, where some person or persons unknown had removed a rail from its place with the evident object of murder and robbery; and

Whereas, It is owing to the bravery and self-sacrifice of Mr. George E. Richardson, who, though faint and bleeding from numerous wounds and bruises received at the hands of the persons intent on wrecking the train, crawled along the track and signaled the train to stop in time to escape the awful catastrophe; therefore, be it

Resolved by the undersigned passengers, That our heartfelt thanks and deep sympathy be extended to the aforementioned George E. Richardson, for his noble deed in saving all our lives and property, and for the suffering he has endured from his wounds, and that we heartily recommend him to the consideration of the railroad company for a suitable reward for his brave and noble deed.
