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CANDIDATE FOR JEMP.

A Negro Fiend Who Will Likely be Lynched.

SALINA, Kan., April 6.—An unknown colored man entered the house of Mrs. Frost in the absence of her husband, snatched a child from her arms and dashed it to the floor, fatally injuring it. Then the fiend brutally outraged the mother. A posse is in pursuit and he will be lynched if caught.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The president sent to the senate the following nominations: Hanna Taylor, of Alabama, minister to Spain; Wm. Lochren of Minnesota, commissioner of pensions.

NEW SENATE OFFICES.

At 2 o'clock a resolution for the election of officers of the senate came up and was agreed to, after speeches complimentary to the present officers by senators from both parties. The new officers are W. R. Cox, of New York, secretary; Richard J. Bright, of Indiana, sergeant-at-arms; W. H. Milburn, of Illinois, chaplain. The senate then proceeded to executive business.

Rhody's Mixed Election.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., April 6.—Today's returns show no election of the state ticket. Baker, Democrat for governor, has a small plurality, while Bennett for secretary of state, and Clark for treasurer, Republicans, have pluralities. Page and Lapham, Republicans, are elected to Congress. The complexion of the general assembly which will elect state officers, is in doubt. It stands on joint ballot, 40 Republicans; 37 Democrats; 31 doubtful.

Hanged for Murder.

PITTSBURG, April 6.—Dennis Cloonan was hanged here this morning for the murder of his wife. He was perfectly cool throughout.

PHILADELPHIA, April 6.—William Moore, colored, was hanged here this morning for the murder of Chas. Madden, also colored, his rival for the affections of Amelia Johnson, who had thrown him over for Madden.

History of the Temple.

SALT LAKE, Utah, April 6.—The site for the Great Mormon Temple, which was dedicated today, was selected July 28, 1847, the fifth day after the Mormons entered the Great Salt Lake valley. February 6, 1853, the ground was broken, and April 8th the corner stone was laid. The cost of the structure is five millions.

Not His Own Choice.

PHILADELPHIA, April 6.—It is stated that the resignation of McLeod as receiver of the reading road is not a matter of his own selection but was demanded of him by the discovery of irregularities in his management while president of the road.

Impending State Officials.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 6.—The joint session of the legislature, this morning adopted articles of impeachment against Secretary of State Allen, Attorney-General Hastings, and Commissioner Humphrey. The articles against ex-State Treasurer Hill will be acted on this afternoon.

The Bribery Chestnut.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—The Evening Post today says the people of the new county of Madera which was formed out of a part of Fresno county, who were opposed to county division, charge that money was corruptly used in securing passage of the bill by the legislature.

Postoffice Robbed.

PORTLAND, April 6.—Burglars blew open the safe of Mount Labor postoffice early this morning. They secured eight dollars in cash, eighty dollars in postage stamps and twelve hundred dollars in promissory notes.

Regulating the Chinese.

MONTPELIER, Vt., April 6.—The first application of Chinese laborers in Vermont for a certificate of residence, under the Geary act, was made to the collector of internal revenue today by Lee Nung. There are 25 Chinese in the state.

Richardson's Trial Set.

ROCHESTER, April 6.—The preliminary trial of Geo. E. Richardson, charged with the attempt to wreck the South Pacific train, has been set for next Tuesday.

Bowler Not Convicted.

PORTLAND, April 6.—The jury in the case of C. A. Bowker, charged with the murder of Helen Wilson, disagreed. They stood ten for acquittal and two for conviction.

BEHRING SEA ARBITRATORS.

Dull Times Before the Court—Eloquence of No Avail.

PARIS, April 6.—The morning session of the Behring sea court of arbitration is dull, even the eloquence of such pleaders as Attorney General Russell and J. Carter failed to awaken interest. Sir Charles Russell concluded the argument in reply to the objections of Hon. E. J. Phelps, counsel for the United States, as to the legal character of certain evidence offered by Great Britain. Carter then proceeded to reply to the six charges.

A WEALTHY MISER.

Found by His Neighbors Stricken With Paralysis.

SOUTH NORWALK, CONN., April 6.—William B. Weed, a very wealthy and eccentric resident of Norton Heights, who lives alone on his large estate in a lonely section of the little town, is dying of a paralytic stroke, which he received several days ago. Weed's house was palatial, and furnished richly. Of late, however, the owner became miserly, and refused to recognize his neighbors or friends. He barricaded all his doors and lived in the kitchen, and threatened to shoot any one who dared to interfere with him or trespass on his lands. Weed had not been seen for several days. On Friday last the neighbors suggested that some one should visit the house and see what had become of him. It was some time before any one plucked up the necessary courage. Finally a party was organized, and, headed by Medical Examiner French and William Hindly, they went to the house. Mr. Hindly looked through one of the windows. He saw Weed lying on the floor near the sofa. When he heard his name called he started to crawl to the door, but fell over and was unable to rise. The door was burst open and the party went in. Dr. French made a hasty examination, and announced that Weed had a severe paralytic stroke. Several persons were secured to look after Weed, but his recovery is doubtful, as his mind is affected.

Interesting the Galleries.

LONDON, April 6.—The galleries of the House of Commons were crowded, but the house itself was not full when Gladstone rose, today, to move the second reading of the Home Rule bill.

Failed in Cincinnati.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, April 6.—Wm. Roush and Co., clothiers, have failed; assets, \$40,000; liabilities, \$80,000.

Women Suffrage Gains a Point.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 6.—The senate passed, today, a bill extending women suffrage in municipal and township elections.

A Heavy Boycott.

NEW YORK, April 6.—The locked out garment workers remained up all night mailing boycott notices against their late employers. They propose to bring conspiracy cases as a test against some of the employers.

A Girl's Mistake.

MORGANFIELD, Ky., April 6.—Miss Abbie Oliver, a beautiful young lady of Sturgis, Union county, was led astray eight months ago. Last night the mother of the girl entered the place of business of Henry Delaney, a drug clerk, and accused him of being responsible for the girl's condition. At the point of a pistol she compelled him to enter a carriage with her husband and daughter. They drove 15 miles to Morganfield, procured a license and compelled him to marry the girl. On the way back the carriage was attacked by armed men on horseback, Delaney's friends, who fired into the carriage. They followed it as it flew up the road, Delaney having jumped out and joined them. The girl was shot through the head, and died this morning. She would soon have become a mother. The father was also mortally wounded. Mrs. Oliver recognized the pursuers, and warrants for their arrest were issued. All belong to prominent families. More bloodshed is expected.

The Duerst Rifle Tested.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., April 6.—The Duerst rifle has received a test at the national armory and passed all the tests to which it was submitted with success. At the conclusion of the tests for endurance the board adjourned further trials until Friday to receive more ammunition from the Frankfort arsenal. M. H. Duerst, the inventor of this gun, is an American by birth, and a resident of Westland, Cal.

CHOLERA RAGING AGAIN

In All Its Former Haunts in Russia.

BEHRING SEA ARBITRATION.

Emin Pasha, the Famous Explorer Reported Murdered.

BEHRING ARBITRATION.

PARIS, April 6.—In the court of arbitration regarding the Behring sea, Phelps continued the argument for the rejection of the supplementary report of the Behring sea commission. "If I had been guiding the policy of the United States," said Phelps, "when Great Britain presented a counter case at the last minute, I would then and there have refused to proceed with arbitration with Great Britain—conduct not only unjust, but deeply humiliating for the United States." Sir Richard Webster interposed the remark that Great Britain announced in the counter case the production at some future date of the Behring sea commissioner's report. Mr. Phelps said he had not been aware of this. The whole report, he said, was unworthy and the British report was neither answered nor commented upon by the United States.

Sir Charles Russell said he had not expected much discussion. He felt quite unprepared for this extraordinary heat on the part of the opposing counsel. He was extremely surprised that Great Britain should be charged with injustice in her conduct of proceedings preliminary to the meeting of the court. There was no intention on the part of Great Britain to use the reports of the Behring sea commission as bearing upon the question of the right before the court. The counsel for the United States attempted throughout the sittings of the tribunal to force this matter upon the commissioners, as if there were only one question before them.

Sir Charles Russell then justified the production of the report of the Behring sea commission, arguing from the terms of arbitration of this treaty. "If," he said, "the sole object of the report was to assist the tribunal to gain information as to the regulation of the practical matters at issue, the report then must be admitted to evidence under the article governing the procedure of the court of arbitration. Sir, Charles Russell then read the article in question and the court adjourned.

CHOLERA IN RUSSIA.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 6.—There is now scarcely any doubt entertained by those who are aware of the real situation that Russia is to again suffer from the ravages of cholera. Concurrent with the setting in of slightly warmer weather, official reports, incomplete as they are, show a recurrence of the disease in nearly all places in which it wrought such frightful havoc last summer and autumn. Official returns are made public showing from March 19th to March 29th there were sixty-five cases of cholera and nineteen deaths from the disease in the town of Orel. The official figures place the number of cases of the disease reported from March 12th to March 27th in the government of Oufa at eighty-four and the deaths at twenty-nine. In addition, it is a matter of common knowledge that the number of cholera cases and deaths from the scourge are far more numerous in the government than are included in the returns. This is especially the case in the governments of Podolia and Saratoff, which were ravaged by cholera last year. It is impossible, however, to obtain the actual number of cases.

Mexico Needs Money.

CITY OF MEXICO, April 6.—A sensation was created by the committee on ways and means of congress reporting a budget announcing that \$42,500,000 will be needed for the government expenses for the coming year. To raise this they suggested an export duty on hemp, coffee, hides, skins and ores.

There was some consternation when this was read, and a great deal of opposition to it. President Diaz, it is understood, is opposed to it very strongly, and will probably try to defeat it, though the consensus of opinion is it will go through. This means a big blow to Mexican trade in the United States.

Indians for the Fair.

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 6.—Haida Indians, under the care of James Deans, leave here for Chicago to take part in the world's fair. A number of totem poles and other curios will also be sent. The Indians are of both sexes, and will, during the exhibition, carry on some of the arts in which they are versed. They will receive \$20 per month and board.

Emin Pasha's Murder.

BERLIN, April 6.—A special from Kampala, Uganda, dated December 16th, last, reports that two apparently authentic statements were received to the effect that Emin Pasha, the famous explorer, had been murdered by fierce Manyamas on the banks of Ituri river in March of last year. The sender of the dispatch was not wholly convinced of its truth.

MRS. CAMPBELL CALDWELL.

Starter Caldwell Says the Dead Woman Was His Wife.

NEW YORK, April 6.—Starter James Caldwell talked to a reporter about the death of Mrs. Campbell Caldwell, which occurred Sunday morning, at 431 West Fifty-seventh street. He said: "I don't speak for myself, but for the woman I loved better than I shall ever love another, a woman who had a right to my name and with whom I expected to live out my days. I protected her during the last days of her life, and I will protect her now that she is dead. The stories that have been published are not true. Mrs. Caldwell obtained a divorce from Dr. Cacao last October in Saratoga. She did not move in to this house the night before she died. She had been here a month. I bought this house January 6th, and have paid \$1500 for furnishing and altering it. Had she lived I should have put it in her name. She died my legal wife. I have no other wife; neither have I a brother-in-law. My daughter lives on a farm I bought for her a mile out of Danville. She is beginning to be known as a writer and I am proud of her. This should disprove the statement that I have deserted a wife and penniless children. My wife's relatives and friends were present at her funeral. Rev. Dr. Thomas H. Hill, of St. Chrysostom's church, officiated. He had known the family for thirty years. He was my wife's godfather. In a few days I shall prepare a statement that will show up the people who have persecuted the woman who bore my name. Until then I have nothing more to say."

Jay Gould's Passes.

NEW YORK, April 6.—A curious feature of the railway exhibit at the Chicago fair will be a neatly arranged collection of railroad and steamboat annual passes once owned by Jay Gould. Through the instrumentality of a gentleman who was closely associated with the famous "Wizard of Wall Street," nearly the entire set of passes issued to Mr. Gould for the year 1881 has been sent to Mr. DeHaven, who will have charge of a special department of the railroad exhibit at the fair. There are about 115 separate bits of pasteboard in the Gould collection, and with the exception of a dozen or so they are all railroad passes. They contain collectively the names of all the important railroads in this country and Canada.

Ministers Recalled.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—A Honolulu letter states that the provisional government has recalled J. Mott Smith, minister to the United States, at Washington, also Consul General Pratt, at San Francisco.

Out of Work.

LONDON, April 6.—Four thousand are thrown out of work by the closing of several collieries in Rhondda valley, South Wales.
