ONE THOUSAND PASSENGERS.

The Overdue Steamer Hekla Reported Coming Slowly.

NEW YORK, April 7.—The disabled and overdue steamer Hekla, from Scandinavian ports, was heard from again, yesterday. The steamer Vaandam, which arrived last evening, sighted the Hekla about 625 miles east of this city, coming slowly westward. She showed no signals indicating that she needed any assistance. She has about one thousand passengers on board.

Ashore at Yaquina.

NEWPORT, Or., April 7.—The four-masted steam schooner, Alice Blanchard, which went ashore here, now lies on the sand near the south jetty, well up the bay. Preparations are being made to lighten her and it is thought she can be floated. The vessel became disabled at sea several days ago, and in attempting to cross the Yaquina bar her rudder chains came loose and locked the wheel.

TACOMA, April 7.—The steamer Alice Blanchard, reported ashore at Yaquina bay, had been chartered from W. G. Hellar, of this city, by Fred Holmes, of San Francisco, for six months. The vessel was insured for \$20,000. She was built here in 1891, at a cost of \$40,000.

CLEVELAND, April 7.—A receiver has been appointed for the Washington Insurance Company, this city. It is one of the oldest in the state, having been in business since 1851. It is said the assets and liabilities are small.

A Negro Killed.

ABERDEEN, Miss., April 7.—A double tragedy is reported from Strong's station. Thomas Bradley was assaulted by a negro farmhand, Dunn Moore, and shot him in self-defense, killing him. Bradley was probably fatally beaten.
