TALKING ABOUT WEATHER.

Snowing, Blowing, Hailing, Raining, and Roasting in the East.

DEATH AND DESTRUCTION FOLLOW.

Houses Wrecked in Illinois, Michigan, South Dakota and Utah.

ACCIDENT AND LOSS OF LIFE.
DELPHI, Ind., April 8.—A terrific rain storm here last night weakened the bridge over Wildcat river, near Rossville, and the north-bound Monon vestibuled train went through the bridge, killing Fireman O'Brien. The body is still under the engine. The loss to the company will be heavy.

FARMER KILLED IN NEW YORK.
BUFFALO, April 8.—Reports from all Western New York, are to the effect that yesterday's wind storm was the severest ever felt in this part of the state. Houses are blown down in many places, and unroofed at others, and vineyards and orchards suffered severely. At Springville the barn of Vedder Hemstreet was blown down on him, killing him.

SNOWING IN THE EAST.
NEW YORK, April 8.—Snow began falling in this city yesterday at 8:30 and continued two hours. Advice from the Catskills state that eight inches of snow fell there, while at Troy and Saratoga the snow reached a depth of three inches. Boston had four inches of snow yesterday.

EIGHTY-TWO IN CHICAGO.
CHICAGO, April 8.—Yesterday was the warmest day Chicago has experienced during the month of April in 20 years. The mercury stood at 82 deg., and a hot wind blew from the south at the rate of 30 miles an hour. The heated spell, however, was broken in the evening by a hail storm, which passed over the southern portion of the city, breaking several thousand dollars' worth of window glass.

ROUGH IN MICHIGAN.
DETROIT, April 8.—Dispatches from several points in Western Michigan report a severe wind storm, accompanied by heavy rain, yesterday. Much damage was done to farm property and some buildings in villages were wrecked. So far as reported no lives were lost.

WIND AND SNOW.
DEADWOOD, S. D., April 8.—A terrible wind and snow storm prevailed in South Dakota yesterday. Telegraph and telephone wires were prostrated. Many buildings were blown down and others unroofed. Piedmont is partially destroyed. All trains are tied up. The velocity of the wind was 75 miles per hour.

WIND STORM IN UTAH.
SALT LAKE, April 8.—Accounts of the Utah wind storm which is just over show it to have been one of the most widespread and severe in the region. Trees were blown down in great numbers, and fences, signs, etc., strewn to the wind. At Eureka the railroad trestle was blown down, and everywhere more or less damage was done. No lives were lost.

Appointment Hanging Fire.
WASHINGTON, April 8.—The case of James H. Bekeles of Illinois, nominated to be comptroller of the currency, appears to be indefinitely hung up in the senate. An energetic effort is being made by some members of the finance committee to have the nomination recalled, but, so far, without success.

Grover and Tammany.
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 8.—Cleveland will go to New York this afternoon, to remain over Sunday. It is believed the visit has something to do with the distribution of federal patronage in the empire state. That the president is willing to treat with Tammany was the inference drawn from an occurrence this morning. Lieutenant Governor Sheehan, one of the Tammany leaders, called at the White House and had a brief interview with the president.

Investigating Martin's Election.
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 8.—The senate committee on privileges and elections this morning decided to report favorably on the resolution permitting it to sit during the recess, to look into the claims of Ady, who is contesting the seat of Martin, of Kansas.

Villard Has Resigned.
NEW YORK, April 8.—Philadelphia dispatches received on Wall street state that Henry Villard has resigned from the Northern Pacific directory.

Anent Chinese Registration.

PORTLAND, April 8.—The collector of internal revenue, today, received the following dispatch from Washington D. C.: "Chinese regulations were modified today dispensing with photographs, and requiring only one creditable witness. Follow this course hereafter, and give such publicity to this change as you can."

Nebraska's Impeached Officials.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 8.—The legislature, in joint convention this morning, adopted articles of impeachment against ex-Attorney General Loez. The probabilities are that the legislature will adjourn sine die this afternoon. The impeachment trials will begin before the Supreme Court on Monday.

Strike on the Santa Fe.

DENVER, April 8.—Private advices from Albuquerque, N. M., are to the effect that all of the mechanics in the employ of the Santa Fe road and of the Atlantic & Pacific struck this morning. This point is of considerable importance as it is the junction of the roads named.

Going out in Topeka.

TOPEKA, Kan., April 8.—Eleven hundred machinists, boiler makers, blacksmiths and helpers in the shops of the Santa Fe road struck this afternoon for an advance in wages and other demands.

Premature Prairie Fire.

NORTH PLATTE, Neb., April 8.—A prairie fire swept into town last night burying sixteen dwellings and much other property, while the town with its 2,000 inhabitants narrowly escaped destruction. The total loss cannot yet be estimated.

Also Near Chamberlain.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., April 8.—Details received here of terrible prairie fires near Chamberlain, in which a large amount of stock has perished and two persons have lost their lives. The people threaten to lynch anyone caught starting fires.

Minnesota Legislature Rowing.

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 8.—There was a row in the legislature this morning over an alleged mistake in voting by which the bill regulating country elevators was passed by one majority, yesterday, but the body refused to reconsider the vote, or allow the man who said he had made a mistake in voting, to correct the error. Then a resolution was offered and passed for the investigation of charges of corruption in the passage of a number of bills and the election of United States senators.

Forgery and Failure.

CINCINNATI, O., April 8.—The failure of Roschheim & Bro. grows more sensational. It is estimated already that the known liabilities of the firm will be a quarter of a million, allowing only \$100,000 for forged paper. It is already known that there are one hundred and thirty thousand dollars in forgeries, mostly of the name of Samuel Aubout, and it is believed not all are heard from as yet.

Eustis To Be Ambassador.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The president, this morning, notified the senate of his desire to raise the rank of Hon. James B. Eustis, lately confirmed a minister to France, to that of ambassador. He also named August Belmont & Co., special fiscal agents of the navy at London, vice the Seligman.

Carl was Discharged.

PORTLAND, Oregon, April 8.—H. L. Carl, of Pendleton, arrested a few days ago for larceny, was discharged today.
