Paper hanging must now be accorded a place among the fine arts; and its professors be classed as bunglers, painters or artists, as their congeners are known in degree as tyros, dabblers and painters. Not very long ago the village whitewasher was the frescoer and decorator of the town and vicinity, but the march of civilization and the education of the masses has brought the inevitable recognition of the fact that homes are brighter and better for being made handsome and attractive. So some of the greatest artists of the day have designed beautiful patterns of wall-paper and frescoes, and the paperhanger has been taught to select those appropriate to the decoration of rooms in relation to the use to which they are to be put.

Salem to See a Woman of Perfect Physical Development.

MISS MABEL JENNESS.
Salem is to be honored with a course of lectures by an eminent disciple of physical culture and artistic dress. Miss Mabel Jenness of New York, is making a tour of the coast with all her rich costumes and has consented to come to Salem.

It is certainly a most favorable sign, when four or five thousand people will listen spellbound for two hours, to a lecture on the hitherto much neglected subject of dress improvement, and correct methods in walking, standing, and sitting. Yet so convincingly does Miss Jenness present her theme, illustrating her talk with a large number of beautiful costumes worn during the evening, that one who has heard her does not wonder that following in her wake the ash barrels and waste heaps of the land become a veritable "valley of Jehoshaphat," for the dried bones and tattering steels of the health impairing, beauty destroying, "glove fitting" corset. Let every woman who wishes to aid others in inaugurating a better, fairer day for women, use her influence to bring her friends to hear Jenness whose ease and simplicity in dress recall some forgotten dream of Hellas. Her words carry conviction to the most obstinate disciples of the "kite shaped" waist.

Gentlemen are cordially invited to attend this lecture, but are asked to withdraw the last ten minutes while Miss Jenness discourses on women's underwear. Place and time of lecture is given in daily papers, street posters and window cards.

A PEN PICTURE.
Boston Globe: Her hair coiled gracefully, and waved above her forehead and temples, preserved the perfect outlines of her head. Her costume was a beautiful gown of white and gold. HER SYSTEM.

The movements of strength are supplemented by beautiful movements of grace, slow and stately, and the best evidence of their potency is seen in the perfect development, exquisite grace, the sinuous, supple motions, and superb carriage of their youthful exponent, who is herself a society girl, and yet finds time to practice her system, and in the midst of her multitudinous duties is never tired, never sick, doesn't know where her nerves are, and is a stranger to headaches. Miss Jenness obtains and holds several poses seen in antique sculpture, her favorites being those of Diana and Mercury. Her method of exercise is as picturesque and original as all the appearances of her toilet, based upon Grecian motives. In her lectures she shows the right and wrong way of performing her exercises, which are too numerous and delicate to be summarized.

The stately young woman allowed the girls to put her sloping shoulders and firm, full chest, to see if she were all real. She suffered herself to be pulled this way and that by the chattering magpies, conscious of being herself a beautiful and gracious woman, and yet what she promised every woman present could make herself to be. Her coming here has been kindly arranged for by Miss Snell, professor of hygiene and dress at the State Agricultural College, in correspondence with Salem ladies.
