CHILDREN—RIGGS.—A quiet wedding occurred at Portland on Friday afternoon at the residence of Dr. J. O. Riggs, corner of Sixth and Clay streets, the contracting parties being Miss Emma Riggs and A. W. Childs, both of Salem, Rev. David Wetzel, of the Christian church performed the ceremony. After partaking of a sumptuous wedding feast the happy couple took their departure for Los Angeles, their future home. Miss Riggs is the youngest daughter of Rufus A. Riggs, an old and highly respected citizen of Salem, and Mr. Childs has for the past four years been a representative of the State Insurance company of this city. The society of the capital city loses by this change of residence two of its most popular members.

SMALL POTATOES.—The governor of this state has received an elaborate steel engraved invitation half as large as a newspaper to attend the Columbian Exposition. The admission card is for May 1st and is labeled "good for one day only." This exception was not made against Oregon but all the governor's tickets read that way. That is very small in the eyes of the governor, who ought to have had a free pass during his stay at least.

WANT OUR TAXES.—Attorney Geo. Bingham has gone to Corvallis, where he will endeavor to collect Marion county's taxes from the Oregon Pacific road. There is about \$7000 due our county from this source, and as a suit for the same was won by the county in the supreme court it is probable that the coin will be forthcoming.

The Bunco Victim Calls on Governor Penney.

This forenoon Oregon's Executive received a call from farmer Skinner, of Polk county, who recently dropped \$2500 for a tin box of gravel in the hands of a bunco steerer.

It was the first meeting between two very much talked about men. The granger wanted to sell the granger governor the same land he sold to the bunco men, for a site for the Deaf-mute school.

SKINNER INTERVIEWED.

THE GRAND BALL.—When Portland's "400" make up their minds to accomplish an object, they generally get there. The grand ball which will come off upon the new floor of the Marquam Grand opera house on Tuesday, April 18, under the auspices of the Women's Exchange, will be a notable affair in the history of social events. It will be the most successful and attractive ball that has ever been given in Portland and the assemblage that will gather upon the occasion, will be a brilliant one. For several weeks artists and designers have been at work under the direction of Manager Friedlander and Capt. Symons preparing the material and decorations for the interior of the auditorium and stage, and it is safe to state that the appearance of the ball upon the night of the 18th will excel anything yet seen on the Pacific coast. A sketch is being made of the floor and stage, by the Oregonian designer and will be published shortly. The number of tickets will be limited to five hundred. A feature of the decorations is the electricity. There will be not less than 1000 prisms. When the dancing is in progress the prisms are expected to quiver and pendulate, emitting scintillating flashes and reflecting in a myriad brilliant rays the light of the electric lamps. Huge vases of natural flowers will be placed at regular distances around the floor and stage, while every bit of woodwork will be wreathed with and hidden in plants and greens.

THE TRAIN WRECKING CASE.

What Detectives and Pinkertons are Doing.

PURELY CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVIDENCE.

How the Company Will Win Either Way It Goes.

THE JOURNAL Tuesday will probably have a complete account of Richardson's preliminary examination at Roseburg. It is the only paper that has not joined in the sleuthlike detective stories, charging the man with the crime before he is convicted.

The statement of Mrs. Darling that she recognized Richardson as the same man she saw hanging about the depot at Salem the night of the Lashley wreck, that is being so widely published as credited to THE JOURNAL, was never printed in this paper. The JOURNAL was offered the story by a railroad man but considered it as far fetched and got up for the purpose of hurting Richardson. As we would not print it, there is no doubt the Pinkertons and detectives have had it circulated as coming from the JOURNAL, for the same purpose. The Oregonian today says: "Deputy Sheriff B. B. Brookway, of Douglas county, came down from Roseburg yesterday to summon witnesses to appear against George E. Richardson, charged with attempted train-wrecking, who will have his preliminary examination in the justice court at Roseburg tomorrow. Mr. Brookway, when seen at the Perkins, said that the evidence was purely circumstantial, but very strong."

If the evidence is purely circumstantial, what witnesses can be produced at Portland? THE JOURNAL still believes the detectives, attorneys and Pinkertons employed by the company are trying to fix this thing upon Richardson as an excuse to justify their existence. Even if Richardson is discharged they will create a cloud of suspicion that will save the company doing anything for him. If their own attorneys convict him the company will save its \$3000 reward.

Richardson will be defended by ex-Congressman Lafayette Lane, of Roseburg, and the prosecution will be conducted by District Attorney Condon of Eugene, assisted by James W. Hamilton, one of the brightest young attorneys in the state. If bound over, the jury trial will take place before Circuit Judge Fullerton, of the second district, during the June term of court.

AN UNJUST JURY LAW.

Some of the Bad Work of the Legislature Shown Again.

ED. JOURNAL.—I have received repeated enquiries of citizens living in almost all parts of Marion county in reference to the provisions of house bill No. 94, presented by Mr. Ormsby, and its history from its inception until its defeat in the senate. It reads as follows:

House bill No. 94, introduced by Mr. Ormsby, by request and read first time January 11, 1900.

A bill to increase the per diem of jurors in certain cases, be it enacted by the legislative assembly of the State of Oregon.

Section I. That all jurors summoned to appear before a justice of the peace, a city recorder when acting as ex-officio justice of the peace, a coroner on holding an inquest over a dead body, or before any other court, shall be entitled to an allowance of two dollars per day, for each day in actual service, and to the further sum of ten cents per mile in going to the place of holding court, and returning therefrom to the place of residence.

Section II. In all cases where a jurymen is summoned to appear before any of the courts above enumerated, if rejected for cause or otherwise, he shall be entitled to an allowance of one day's service and mileage as above specified.

Section III. All acts or part of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

Section IV. This act shall be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

The history of the above bill is as follows: It was presented by Captain Ormsby on the 11th day of January, 1900, and read first and second time in its regular order and was then referred to the judiciary committee where it remained for two or three weeks unreported, and in the mean time I was called before said committee to explain the necessity of such a measure; this I did as I thought to the satisfaction of every member of said committee except one, and that one was a member from our own county, who declared himself openly against said measure, so this matter stood for considerable time longer, but was finally reported to the house with recommendation that it do not pass, and was then indefinitely postponed, thus the little bill received its death blow by the attorneys constituting the judiciary committee. Why any attorney should oppose this measure is more than I can see, is certainly no legal question as connected with it or attached to it, but if it had been passed it would have been a matter of justice to those of our fellow citizens who will be called on to serve as jurors in the said courts above referred to.

There is in fact no reason why any "attorney" should oppose the payment of this reasonable fee to our jurors who pay their taxes regularly as any other class and are obedient to all the laws of our country. If there is any reason why jurors should be made to serve their country without pay, while other persons who are no better than they receive full pay for all their work, I would like for some of those talented gentlemen to step forward and give us a clear solution of the case. I fear, however, that the only reason for this opposition was that those "gentlemen" fear their clients will be a little like our old friend Joseph L. Meek was, who was the first marshal of the territory of Oregon. I think the incident I am going to relate happened at Oregon City in 1848 or '9. Judge O. C. Pratt was holding court, and when the court was about over the jury and witnesses, all appeared before the marshal and began to demand their pay, but Uncle Joe Meek was equal to the emergency and declared to them all that there was no money for them, for said he "there is barely enough for the officers." If it had been true that the opposition to this bill was on account of increasing our taxes, as some of the opponents stated, I could have passed it by, but as I am led to believe this was not the cause, from the way that appropriations were made for almost every purpose that human imaginations could

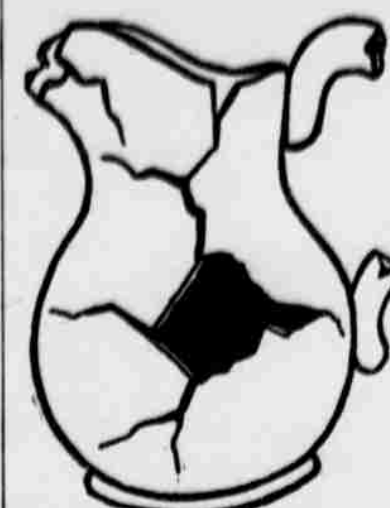
