SEVERAL CHANGES.—On and after the 17th inst. there will be a change in the running of trains on the Oregon Pacific. Train 6 will leave Detroit at 7 a. m. arriving in Albany at 11:15 a. m., leaving Albany at 1:30 p. m. arriving at Detroit at 5:40 p. m. The name of the station at the eastern terminus has been changed from Coe to Detroit. Train 1 from Yakima will arrive in Albany at 11:48 a. m. and leave for Yakima at 12:35. The accommodation train leaves Albany for Yakima at 8:40 a. m. The freight train will leave Corvallis for Albany at 3:30 p. m. instead of 2:50. This arrangement will be a great accommodation to the patrons of the road for summer travel.

TREE PLANTING OBSERVED

In All the Salem Schools With Good Programs.

THE JOURNAL observes Arbor Day, instituted by J. Sterling Morton of Nebraska, who has since become a member of President Cleveland's cabinet, by presenting several columns of poems and matters appropriate to the occasion. The day is generally kept throughout this county and the state.

IN OREGON

the observance of the day is largely due to the systematic efforts of State Supt. McElroy, who has each year since the law was enacted issued a circular, setting forth the purpose and spirit of the day, with complete program for its being carried out properly in cities or villages, country schools or colleges. These are distributed to all the school officers of the state through the county superintendents.

THE EFFECT

of observance of Arbor Day is to preserve the beautiful natural native shade trees adorning the grounds and to set out as well. This year a great deal of shrubbery was set out and in another year the desire for ornamentation may extend to planting flower beds and even to landscape gardening. The stormy weather interfered somewhat with outdoor exercises.

The programs at the various schools of this city are given below with notes on the exercises at each, which took place at 1 p. m. this afternoon.

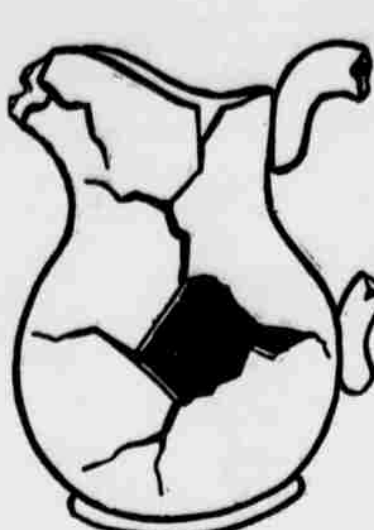

Eggs of the World For London.

There was a time when all foreign eggs in this country were known as "French eggs." Now, thanks to improved means of transport, they come to us from a variety of countries. The annual import, according to the latest official returns, reaches the enormous number of nearly 1,300,000,000, valued at \$250,000,000. France and Germany still furnish more than one-half of the whole. Belgium, Russia and Denmark come next in order as egg exporters to this country. The Canadian quota has increased from 2,000,000 to 23,000,000 in a single year, and we have now laid under contribution a variety of minor sources, among which, it is curious to note, are the Canary Islands, Turkey and Egypt.—London News.
