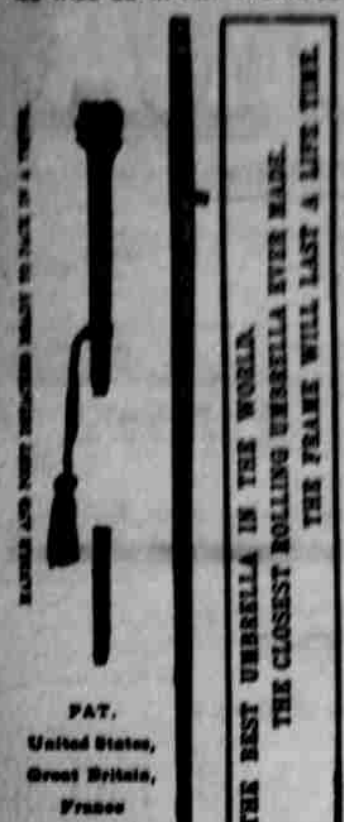

STATE STREET BURLARIES.

Two Grocery Stores Attacked, But No Losses Sustained.

Burglars were at work last night at several stores on State street. At Steiner & Son's a glass in the rear door was broken at 1:30 this morning. Adam Bauer, who sleeps upstairs, heard the glass crash and was awakened and went down stairs to drive them off. He does not know how many there were, but thinks there were two.

Two Jimmies were used, one being left on the lot, the men jumping off and running away when disturbed. Unable to pry open the door they broke a glass, but effected no entry. Two strangers and suspicious looking characters passed by the store this morning and looked at it curiously. They are under surveillance by the police.

ON TO BOISE CITY.

The Oregon Pacific to Be Pushed Through.

IMPORTANT NEWS FOR THIS VALLEY.

The Present Bond Holders Adopt a Policy of Extension.

Oregonian, 20th: John P. Fay, an attorney at Seattle, arrived in this city yesterday from New York, where he has been for the past two months in connection with the removal of Colonel T. Egerton Hogg from the receivership of the Oregon Pacific and obtaining possession of the books of the receiver and property of the receivership in that city. For the past two years Mr. Fay has represented the Smith and Wharton committee, who are holders of the bonds of the Oregon Pacific to the amount of about \$5,500,000, and has had entire charge of and conducted the prolonged and repeated litigation which these committees have waged against the management of Colonel Hogg as receiver of the road, and which finally resulted in his removal by order of the court March 4, 1909. Mr. Fay said that he did not care to repeat the story of the litigation, as the various details have been published and are still fresh in the minds of the public. In regard to the policy of the bondholders, he said:

"The policy of the bondholders I represent has been from the beginning and now is in favor of developing the railroad and the adjoining country as rapidly as it can be done on safe business principles. Among these bondholders are John I. Blair, James A. Blair, Joseph Wharton, Alexander Brown, Lindsey Smyth, George deB. Keim and Sylvester Kneeland. From the very beginning they have advocated a reorganization of the road and the completion of the line to Boise City as rapidly as the business of the country would warrant, and have earnestly advocated every improvement which would tend toward encouraging the settlement, cultivation and building up of the fields and tracts in Oregon which this road now enters, and which in time, as completed, will open up other tracts equally as fertile and prolific as those covered by the portion of the road now in operation.

"The new receiver, E. W. Hadley, assisted by his general superintendent, Mr. Mulcahy, has demonstrated during the past 30 days that the road can be run without loss, and by proper management can be converted into an income-paying property. His success is a matter of general satisfaction among all Eastern bondholders, and has largely tended to restore confidence among them in regard to the ultimate success of the road, and has gained for him their unanimous support. If the road continues to show during the next 30 days equally good results, we may fairly expect that work will soon be commenced for the completion of the line.
