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RECONSTRUCTED REPUBLICANISM.

Oregon is not a Democratic state. Above all this is not a Cleveland state. It is not a People's party state; at least, not of the calamity howling variety. Oregon is a Republican state; but not a Republican state after the fashion of the late Republican state legislature. The influence that organized that legislature would undoubtedly be defeated at the polls if they dominated in the next Republican state convention. Reconstructed Republicanism can carry Oregon next spring. But the machine will have to draw its inspiration from the country more than from the city of Portland. The party must plant its roots in the soil rather than in the offices of a few corporation lawyers of the metropolis. Oregon is a good deal of a fusion state. There has been but one Republican governor in twenty odd years. A fusion presidential elector was chosen last November. If a deal is made by which the Democrats will take the state offices and the Populists the legislature and congressmen, fusion will be strong next year in Oregon. There are those who believe such a combination would send a populist to the United States senate. Old Republican organs have expressed that belief.

THE JOURNAL believes it fairly voices conservative rural Republicanism in making this suggestion. In reorganizing the party the newer parts of the state must be recognized. The head, heart, lungs, body and brain are not all in Portland. Republican clubs should be organized in every village and hamlet of the state. But not by a Johnny Ayers machine. Portland influences predominated too much in the campaign last year. The committee was all made up there. All the money was spent there. There was no campaign made except by a few Portland speakers or men working for Portland. There was not a notice published in the name of the Republican party except through the Oregonian. Portland is nearly one-third of the state. So Portland dominated in both branches of the late legislature. Men like Penner, Gear, Upton, Ford and others who spoke at all for the country were ignored in the legislature and were not able to cope with the gang of metropolitan bodders that scattered new state institutions broadcast like thistle down, and caused unconstitutional appropriations to flow like water. The people will never endorse at the polls the reckless conduct of this so-called legislature. If they are asked to do so in the name of Republicanism the party will make a mistake.

To illustrate: Were the referendum in vogue not one half the measures enacted would ever dare be submitted to the people, or if they were would stand not the remotest chance of success. With the party retired in the national government, and a campaign of state issues only before it in Oregon the record of this legislature will be fought over in all its details. Unless the party is entirely reorganized, will any Republican in the state or any Republican paper tell us where we are at? Representative Guilkson, of Portland, who secured the passage of the \$100,000 militia appropriation and who elected the new railroad commission it is said, can go before the people in the name of that legislature and make votes for Republicanism? Mr. Keady, the Speaker, has never discussed his \$100,000 job with the people at the polls. Can Mr. Keady as speaker, or that appropriation be made successful planks of the platform? This legislature, like the McKinley congress, did too much, and it is very doubtful if any of the leaders of either house can defend successfully its record before the people or can be placed on a Republican State ticket that would in any manner strengthen the party. The party to endure or succeed must be reorganized by counties and by precincts. The foundation must be laid out on the farms rather than in the law offices of a city. The head, center, front, left wing, right wing, camp and baggage of the army cannot any longer be kept at Portland and win a battle.

What rogue in jail or murderer on the gallows but proclaims his innocence and professes religion? The state could make much better use of its money than in the development of such hypocrisy.

Representative Upton asked for a few thousand dollars of the legislature so that poor girls could go to the State Agricultural college and learn to sew, mend, cook and study the laws of physical culture. It was refused. To aid such worthy and deserving poor to become intelligent self-sustaining citizens would certainly be a better investment than to pay men already salaried to extract pretended professions of religion out of the gaol and crooked trunks of manhood at the state prison.

If these appropriations for moral instruction and education of defective classes are to be made let the money be invested where it will do future generations some good and prevent the little children of the very poor and the very rich from growing up into these very criminals now sought to be ministered to at \$5.00 an hour. The very men inside of the cells would say, go teach those who yet can be saved from coming to what we are become.
