## THE MINISTERIAL STRIFE.

No Action by the State Boards on  
the Resolutions.

The boards of the state institutions have taken no action as such on the resolutions of the striking Salem ministers' union. As a matter of fact the ministers' union was offered \$4,000 for each service at the state asylum, the Reform school, and \$2,500 at the state prison, which they refused to take. While there was no specific appropriation for any such purpose, the authorities thought they could secure that much to pay for their services, for a time at least, until some provision was made, and it was thought to be a reasonable and fair remuneration. The expense of these services would have come out of the general expense fund of the several institutions. Having been refused, the offer cannot be renewed. However willing the several state authorities may have been to have paid the above reasonable compensation for ministerial services, there is in our mind a very grave doubt whether there could have legally been any of this money paid for such a purpose. One of their defenses is that they are not after money. Their strike is entirely from principle. Yet part of their conditions, as stated by their resolutions, is that if a visiting non-union minister is invited to officiate at a state institution the compensation must be paid to the Salem union ministers "all the same." If they are not after money, what are they after?

The Salem papers seem to uphold the strike. The one in which the official defense of the Salem Ministerial Union is made over its own proper signature says they ought to have \$5,000 for each service. It is learned at the state house that the resolutions in which the strike was ordered were not given out by the authorities, but must have "leaked" out of the Union. The press of the whole state is talking about the action of the Salem ministers. As a rule the criticism is unfriendly. The Roseburg Plaindealer says:

According to the SALEM JOURNAL, the ministers of that city do not take much stock in that passage of Scripture which says something about the gospel being free, without money and without price, and have gone on a strike for better pay for their services in the state institutions. They have unanimously resolved that not a prayer will be uttered, nor a sermon preached nor a soul absolved without a cash consideration. Verily, "the workman is worthy of his meat," but, ordinarily, "those who dance must pay the piper," and just what right state officials—boards, trustees and superintendents—have to use the public funds to pay for prayers and sermons has never been satisfactorily explained.

A JUTE MILL.—Governor Penoyer went out to the state penitentiary today to look over the premises with a view toward making a start on the jute mill provided by the last legislature. He was accompanied by John Rutherford, of San Francisco, a jute expert and experienced manufacturer, who is an applicant for a position in the Oregon mill. They were shown over the premises by Supt. Downing.

WILL FENCE.—The Southern Pacific's fencing gang have arrived and are now engaged in fencing the railway tracks, in accordance with a law enacted by the late legislature. The company is putting up a combination board and wire fence which will most certainly save considerable money to the corporation by lessening the loss of stock and adding to the safety of travel.

ENFORCE THE LAW.—A Portland man is making an issue against cigarette smoking, which he pronounces the ruin of any young man using the filthy things. He reports 21 cases in Portland of prosecution for violation of the law prohibiting their sale, and says there will be three cases in Corvallis next week. It is strange anyone can be found who will sell them to boys.

CINDERELLA.—The coming event in theatricals will be the grand spectacular production, at Reed's opera house Monday evening, May 1st, of "Cinderella." This famous fairy tale will be produced, with all its beautiful scenery, artistic properties, calcium lights, dazzling costumes, bright new music, and refined specialties, by a company of twenty-five people.

WE ARE GROWING.—The Salem postoffice has been designated as a money order office of the first class, and that means it will hereafter be a depository of money order and postal note surplus funds from all parts of Oregon. It increases the compensation of the postmaster not a little, which several gentlemen who do not read the Democrat will be delighted to know.

SALEM, Oregon, April 24, 1893.  
TO THE PUBLIC: I notice in the Daily Independent an article which refers to my private family affairs, and which I think beneath the dignity of a newspaper that makes any pretensions to common decency. The article alleges that I have been receiving professional services for my wife donated as charity, and that my present physician Dr. Powell Reeves has practically robbed me of a cow.
