**TILE DRAINAGE FOR THE FARM.**

Sunday, April 30, 1893.

Ed. JOURNAL: Today it rains again and the average farmer is getting pretty "blue" over the prospect.

But the man who has his ground tiled out thoroughly is all right. Did you ever notice stripes through the fields where grain is growing, where the lap or top furrows are, that is always taller and better grain, with a better color, than the rest of the field. Now the reason of this is only that this strip is better drained because it is above the rest of the field a few inches.

Then if all the field was as well drained, the whole field would evidently be as good as these best strips. Now this is exactly what drainage does. One man over on the La Creek or "Rickerd," who has tried it, says in two years the increase in his grain crops paid for all his work and tile, and more.

The actual cost of tile to drain an acre of ground is only eight to twelve dollars, and almost any farmer can do the work by a little study and the use of a little common sense.

One thing is necessary and that is good tools and the right kind. A tile spade 18 or 20 inches long to dig with, and a rounded tile hoe to clean out the bottom, is absolutely necessary. The common spades or round pointed shovels are no good for this work. A great many people have tried to dig out a ditch with spade or shovels and would think from their experience that it would be an everlasting job to dig a few thousand feet of the ditch, but it is easier to dig a tile ditch twenty inches deep with the right kind of tools, than to dig out eight inches with a round pointed shovel.

Nearly every farmer sees the advantage of drainage, and make more or less effective shifts to drain, by plowing the land in ridges, plowing deep dead furrows and digging open ditches in the fields; yet all of these are objectionable. The deep furrows and ridges are hard to get over, and, as in the case of open ditches, there is a great deal of land wasted by furrow and ditch and allowed to grow up to weeds to seed the other parts of the field. All this makes extra work and lessens the yield of grain or other products of the field. Then it is an eternal job to keep these open ditches and furrows open. Nature is working against you all the time, trying to bring the ground down to a general level, washing down your ridges, breaking down banks of ditches with frost, sunshine and rain, and it is an uphill job to buck against nature and her laws. On the other hand if the ground is once thoroughly tiled, it is done for all time. Your children's children to the hundredth generation, will never need to do it over, and nothing in this world will ever disturb their even flow, except an earthquake that disturbs the present levels of the earth. The fields can be plowed or worked all over and in every direction and there are no fifteen-foot turn rows every few rods over the field to try the temper and destroy the profits of working. It is well known that it costs no more to plant and harvest a crop of 40 or 50 bushels of grain per acre than one of 10 or 15 (except possibly the threshing bill) and of course all grown above the normal average will be almost clear gain. If farmers only knew it, they have lost more this past year, from lack of drainage and miserable substitutes for it, than all their taxes have amounted to in a dozen years, as high and unreasonably as they are.

I don't raise wheat any more, but I believe that even 57 cents a bushel for wheat can be made to pay a profit if

the fields are put in shape by draining, as even 5 bushels extra per acre would soon pay all expenses, and leave a margin for profit. Another thing, some one asked me a few days ago, how long it would be after a field was drained out, until it would need irrigation. Now it will be just as soon as a sponge ceases to absorb within its reach, and no sooner.

The effect of tile drainage is to cause the earth to become porous and full of little openings that hold moisture while allowing the surplus or useless water to escape. Therefore it has all the beneficial effect of a deep subsoiling and at less cost. I believe that the effect of tiling is greatly expedited if not wholly caused by our friends the worms. Notably the angle-of-fish worm. He eats the dirt and digests it and leaves minute channels through the ground in every direction and will always go down as deep as the water will allow him to go and as the water rises will work his way up, until he is driven out at the top in the sunshine here he falls a prey to the higher forms of life, as birds and animals. "The Formation of the Vegetable World Through the Action of Worms," by the eminent scientist and naturalist Chas. Darwin, gives a very good insight into some of these points, but the principal thing to the average farmer will pay, and the most satisfactory way to learn this is to try a few acres this spring and I predict that those who do, will not be satisfied with a few acres, but will decide that it does pay with a big P.

**Peonages Recently Became Extinct.**

The peonages which became extinct in 1892, between the dukedom of Clarence and Avondale, are given as the marquessate of Drogheda, the earldom of Charleotte, the viscountcy of Sherbrooke and the baronies of Bramwell and Wimmerleigh. The lesser titles of earl of Drogheda and Viscount Charlemont, however, still survive. Between the 1892 and 1893 editions of "Burke" six dukedoms died—the Dukes of Clarence, Devonshire, Manchester, Marlborough, Roxburgh and Sutherland, one marquis (Drogheda), eight earls (Charlemont, Denbigh, Eglington, Errol, Essex, Harwood, Leitrim and Litchfield), three viscounts (Dillon, Hampden and Sherbrooke) and 10 barons (Abinger, Bathurst, Bramwell, Beaumont, Castlemaine, French, Stafford, Tennyson, Teynham and Wimmerleigh).

Seventeen baronetcies have been created, and three have become extinct, while 82 baronets have died. Two dukedoms and 16 baronies have been created, three persons have been promoted, and one peerage, that of Conyers, has been called out of abeyance in favor of the Countess of Yarborough.—London News.

**A Funny Thing About Tips.**

I was a good deal surprised to read the statement that at the new Waldorf hotel Mr. Astor, its owner, has inaugurated the foreign fashion of not compensating the head porter, or of leaving him to find his recompense in the fees he may receive from the guests of the establishment. It is only a short time ago that I read that Mr. Astor had endeavored to break up the well established custom in England of the payment of gratuities to servants by the guests whom he might invite to his London mansion.

This custom has always seemed to Americans to be extremely obnoxious, but it prevails abroad to a most annoying degree. I do not refer to the tipping in public places.
