THE SHAW SHOOTING CASE.

Trial of H. A. Bowman on Charge of Assault.

At 11 o'clock this morning Recorder Edes's office was again packed with spectators to witness the trial of H. A. Bowman on charge of assault on W. A. Shaw with a dangerous weapon.
Mr. Bowman appeared without an attorney, knowing that he was innocent, and that in all justice he could only be discharged.
It soon became apparent that it was not Bowman the prosecution was after, but the CAPITAL JOURNAL, and its publishers.
Because Shaw could not silence this paper he is trying in his feeble way to blacken it, that people will not believe its statements concerning his disgraceful escapades.
Attorneys Condit and Ford appeared for the prosecution, and did some hard work for their client, but every witness called gave such testimony as can only tend to further entangle their man in the meshes of the law.

WITNESSES CALLED
Dr. Reynolds sworn: Practiced 25 or 30 years. Know Miss Ferris. Treated her March 16 to April 10. She suffered at first from acute indigestion. March 16 was called to treat her for peritonitis. Her case was severe for a time. Was uneasy about her. Advised to send for Miss F's mother. She went home, but as case revived she returned for treatment. She told me she was attending school at the East Salem building. She quit school on my advice. Knew Mr. Shaw had been there often, but only understood that Mrs. Shaw had been there.

A. F. Hofer was called, and asked if he had agreed to take money from Shaw to suppress news, to which he answered no. He also stated that Shaw had offered money for that purpose.
W. H. Downing: Saw Hofer at his house and at office and thought things looked bad for Shaw, and thought he ought to get out of it as cheaply as possible. Hofer did not say he wanted any money, and said he did not know that certain witnesses would settle for money.

Mr. Wm. Sims sworn: Was at Shaw's office when Hofer called Saturday. Heard very little of the conversation, but that was about money.
Adjourned to 4 o'clock.
The trial of Bowman is only a farce, as another man has confessed to doing the shooting, and is bound over for it. Bowman has proven that he was at his room in another part of the city when the act took place. He is simply used to make a target of the JOURNAL. The latter can stand it, and courts the most thorough investigation. It has nothing against Mr. Shaw, but as every hour of his mad persecution is simply further blackening his character, it can only stand by and laugh at his folly.

CITY COUNCIL MATTERS.

The council and city officers met in regular session last evening, with all present except Alderman Olmstead.

The committee on fire and water reported against selling the city's hand engine.
The new bridge on East Capital street was accepted, and a warrant for the city's share was ordered drawn.
The dog ordinance was referred.
Amended city hall specifications were read, and were referred to the city attorney, to confer with the supervisor of work, and report at next meeting.

The city engineer was instructed to repair the South Commercial street bridge across South Mill creek.
A communication from Leo Willis, manager of Reed's opera house, stating the circumstances of the trouble between the city police and the manager of a recent minstrel show, and asking if the police were legally entitled to enter the theatre without paying the price of admission, was referred to the city attorney.

A petition for the improvement of Liberty street from Chemeketa to Mission, and the construction of a 30 foot bridge across South Mill creek, was referred.
The city engineer was instructed to notify the Consolidated Street Railway Co. to repair the damage done to portions of Chemeketa, 18th and Center streets.

The petition for a sidewalk on a portion of block 18 was referred.
A petition for the improvement of Ferry street between Liberty and Church was referred.

A communication from the Salem Water Co. asking the privilege of "blowing off" the city hydrants was referred to the chairman of the fire and water committee with power to act.
The ordinance for a new contract for city lights was read the first time and referred to the city attorney. It provides for a contract between the city and the Salem Consolidated Street Railroad Co. to furnish an improved lighting service. The conditions of the contract provide: That the company will furnish forty-three lights, or more, for a period of twelve years for \$10 per month each; that the lamps, wiring and poles shall be improved in appearance; that all lamps shall be suspended above the center of the street intersections thirty-three to thirty-five feet above the grade of the street; that all poles shall be of cedar painted with two coats of paint and shall not be less than forty feet in height or measure less than seven inches in diameter at the top; that the quality and reliability of the light furnished shall at all times be strictly first-class as compared with that furnished to any other city in the United States and nothing but casualty or accident shall excuse the company from having such lamps in operation from dusk until daylight each and every night; that in the event any light fails to burn at least one hour in the aggregate the city shall deduct 33 1/3 cents for each lamp for every night of such failure. There are many additional provisions to insure perfect lighting and to carry out the contract the company will have to expend fully \$25,000 for an entirely new lighting plant.

The cow ordinance was passed, preventing domestic animals from running at large within the city.
Mayor Gatch appointed W. F. Boothby to supervise the construction of the new city hall, which was ratified by the council.
Recorder Edes was instructed to make a statement of the outstanding city warrants.
Chief Engineer Low and Engine Driver John Duncan were each given a week's leave of absence.

WHERE ARE THE BIRDS?
EDITOR JOURNAL: I call your attention and that of your readers to the fact that our birds are missing. I do

not remember having seen a meadow lark this spring. A few robins were here for a few days but none are here now. Our usual number of blue birds are missing. I have noticed but one in several days. Probably others are missing as well as these I name. This is a most serious state of things and if it continues, the insects will increase in such countless numbers as to destroy all our crops both grain and fruit.
What is the cause of this? I see by the papers that in Canada they have forbidden the people spraying the fruit trees because it kills the bees. Destroy the bees and you destroy the fruit. Does spraying the trees have any thing to do with destroying our birds? Let observers observe and investigators investigate and see if the cause can be found.
Mr. Editor, as you appear to be an agitator I place this in your hands that you may agitate the good people of Oregon until we can get a little more knowledge of the ways to retain our friends and destroy our enemies.
