FRUIT GROWERS.—An important meeting of fruit growers of Salem and all the surrounding country is to be held at Salem Tuesday, May 9th, to organize if possible a fruit growers, shippers, driers and packers union. The plan is to establish a system by co-operation, whereby carloads can be put down in Eastern markets direct. The fruit can be packed uniformly and a shipping clerk employed to get rates of freight to Eastern points. It is not yet known where the meeting will be held, but all interested should make it a point to attend.

KELLER & SONS' CORNER.
Justice is sometimes a little slow. Deputy Sheriff and J. L. Roe, guard, brought James Hard from Jackson county this morning. He is sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment for murdering his father-in-law, James Arnold in that county in 1887. Hard disappeared and did not return to Jackson county until two months ago. Hard enlisted in the Klamath war, a few weeks after he was married, but before going to fight the Indians moved his father-in-law and family onto his donated land claim, which the latter home-stayed in his absence, and out of which treacherous conduct a quarrel arose that led to the crime. Hard claims that Arnold was intimate with his own daughter after he married her, but rather than expose the woman on trial he allowed himself to be convicted and would serve fifteen years rather than blacken her name. The whole case reads like a romance, and shows that while justice is sometimes a laggard, she gets there just the same.

THE TRUSTEES ENJOINED.

From Proceeding With a Soldier's Home at Roseburg.

Judge Burnett this morning enjoined the trustees, appointed by the governor to locate a Soldier's Home in Oregon, from any further proceedings in selecting a site or erecting a building at any other place than the seat of government of the state which is Salem. Following is a copy of the

PRELIMINARY INJUNCTION.
In the circuit court of the state of Oregon, for the county of Linn, D. C. Sherman, plaintiff, vs. A. J. Bellows, James Byron, J. W. Mullin, Charles Nickell, and S. S. Train, as trustees of the Oregon Soldier's Home, Defendants.

On reading the complaint in the above entitled suit and hearing Mr. A. O. Condit, attorney for plaintiff it is ordered that defendants show cause if any they have, at chambers at the county court house in Salem, Marion county, Oregon, on Tuesday, May 23d, 1893 at 2 o'clock p. m. of said day why a preliminary injunction should not issue according to the prayer of the complaint in this suit and that in the meantime the defendants and each of them be and they are hereby restrained and enjoined until further order of the court or judge thereof from locating the Oregon Soldier's Home or selecting a site therefor at any other place than at the seat of government of the state of Oregon.

It is further ordered that this order be served on the defendants and each of them at least ten days before said May 23d, 1893.

Returns From a Tour of the Great School Centers.

Mrs. S. G. Grubbe returned last night from a two months' trip to the east. On this voyage she discovered what was best and what was worst in the schools of America. She visited Winnepeque, Montreal, Troy, N. Y., and New York City, where she made her longest stay, visiting public schools, normal schools and kindergartens.

In New York City boys and girls are kept separate. In the schools everywhere she was shown the work being prepared for the world's fair. It seemed to be the one task that engaged them all with great results.

In Montreal the normal schools were visited, and it may be said in a general way that Mrs. Grubbe did not find the dominion schools up to our own standards.

She visited Col. Parker's Cook county normal school where she met Miss Beebe formerly of Salem. Here she saw a class of 250 young ladies in physical culture, each having a child to instruct before her.

The climate in the east she found less springlike than Oregon, except the city of Washington. Mrs. Grubbe returns to her duties as City Superintendent tomorrow.

The T. L. Pope road was ordered established.

Mrs. Joseph Austin, of near Silverton, was allowed \$10 for May.

The annual report of County School Superintendent Graham was accepted.

W. B. Brown, L. D. Smith and Eugene Manning were appointed viewers to relocate a certain part of the Bell-pass road, to meet May 22d and make view.

The petition for aid to extend the approach 270 feet of the bridge across Butte creek on the J. L. Seeley road was not granted.

L. M. Reeder was appointed road supervisor of road district No. 29.

The petition for a change in Salem and Silver falls road was not allowed.

An allowance of \$40 was granted for purchasing a right of way to avoid building two bridges across Battle creek in road district No. 3.

The petition for a bridge across the Abiqua at Morley's farm was continued.

M. H. Bowman's petition for aid in road improvement was not allowed.

Mrs. Nancy Rose was given a further allowance of \$2 per month.

The sheriff's report was accepted and the clerk was ordered to prepare the delinquent roll and draw a warrant for its collection.

Scott Walter Being Lionized.

Sir Walter Scott is an example of a great man, who, so far as we can judge, enjoyed paying the penalties of his greatness, even in his hour of death.
