SUCCESSFUL CO-OPERATION.

Willamette Valley Fruit Growers Form an Organisation.

There was a large attendance of fruit growers at the county court room Tuesday, and a great deal of enthusiasm manifested by those present.

The purpose was to organize and by co-operative effort secure better results out of the immense crop coming on this year. Our fruit growers propose to pack on the farms in regulation boxes, have uniform labels and ship together in carloads to the East.

J. M. Wallace was elected chairman and F. J. Beatty secretary as the preliminary work of organization. The committee, consisting of J. A. Shepard, Prof. M. W. Smith, J. A. Van Eaton, H. W. Cottle and J. M. Lawrence, appointed to submit a plan of organization and prepare articles of incorporation, reported at 1:30 p. m.

They drew up articles which were adopted. They provide for the incorporation of "The Willamette Valley Fruit Growers' exchange" and are as follows:

"The object of this incorporation is, and it shall have power, to deal in the various fruits grown in the Willamette valley; to handle the same upon commission, properly grade, pack and ship; and to do such other acts as will facilitate the growing, grading, drying, packing, shipping and selling of fruits, both dried and green.

"The duration of the corporation shall be perpetual. The capital stock of the corporation shall be \$10,000 divided into 2,000 shares of \$5 each. The subscription of stock shall be limited to one share for each acre of trees, vines and berries owned."

The principal office shall be at Salem and the affairs of the exchange are to be managed by a board of nine directors. The incorporators are James R. Shepard, Charles Long, J. A. Van Eaton, H. W. Cottle and R. F. Myers.

J. A. Shepard, Charles Long, J. A. Van Eaton, H. W. Cottle and R. F. Myers were appointed a committee to solicit subscriptions and within a quarter of an hour after adjournment \$1,080 of the stock had been subscribed. The association adjourned to meet at the call of the soliciting committee.

The fruit growers in attendance at the meeting represented 538 acres of orchard. This is the first grand step in the right direction, towards independence of the producer from middlemen and better results for fruit crops.

TRAIN OF MILLIONAIRES.

Vanderbilt's Son-in-Law Passes Through Salem.

Salem early risers might have seen the most magnificent railway train in the world had they been at the Southern Pacific passenger depot this morning at seven o'clock.

It was the train of six Wagner Palace cars carrying Dr. Webb, only son-in-law of Cornelius Vanderbilt, his family and a select party of millionaire friends, fifteen in all, with many servants, butlers, cooks and maids, or thirty people in all.

Dr. Webb's car was the last. As he is president of the Wagner Palace Car Co., his coach was finished in gold, with heavy silver guard rails securely vestibuled off from the outside world.

His guests are all millionaires, and the reporter was assured by the beautifully liveried servants in charge of the train that this was without doubt the richest train and the richest list of passengers ever hauled across the state. All were multi-millionaires, who dined on the breasts of peacocks and slept on swansdown. No interviews were possible.

THE MINNESOTA LEGISLATURE.

Portland Oregonian: A bill for an act in relation to the manufacture and sale of baking powders, to prevent fraud and preserve the public health has been introduced in the legislature at St. Paul. The bill is intended to prevent the alteration of baking powders with alum or ammonia, imposing proper penalties to enforce the law.

"Hercules." This powder contains ammonia.

"Crystal." This powder contains alum.

"Double Quick." This powder contains alum.

"Silver Star." This powder contains alum.

"White Lily." This powder contains alum.

U. S. Crop-Weather Bulletin.

No frosts are reported. The weather has been very favorable during the past week to the growth of vegetation and to farm work. The ground is slowly drying out and becoming more suited to plowing. There is yet a comparatively large acreage of wheat and oats yet to be seeded, especially on the low lands. Fall sown wheat on low lands is somewhat injured, it was slightly scalded by the hot sun of the 6th; on higher lands it is growing finely and in places it is two feet high. Barley is in head in parts of Marion and Linn counties. Corn planting has been greatly delayed; the acreage of corn will be increased over that of last year. Hops are in places growing rapidly; while in others, especially on the west bank of the Willamette, the yards have not yet been grubbed and the weeds are rampant. The hop acreage is expected to be considerably larger than last year. Garden work is very late, much of the soil being yet too wet to work. In Washington county early sown onions are now ready for weeding. Grass has a fine growth and is very luxuriant.

Cattle were in poor condition, but are now rapidly improving. Sheep

shearing has commenced and good fleeces are reported.

In the northern coast counties cherries are in bloom. In the interior, valley fruit is generally in full bloom and the trees are nearly in full leaf. The petals of the early bloom are falling. Fears are entertained that the cold, wet weather has been injurious to the peach and cherry blossoms. Present prospects are favorable to a successful and bounteous harvest notwithstanding the cold, rainy and backward season.
