Militia at the World's Fair.

Portland Telegram: There will be no special display of military at the world's fair. The bill introduced into the senate by Senator Mitchell, providing for mobilizing the militia, failed to pass, and of the various schemes suggested none have materialized. There is absolutely no preparation being made at Chicago for the reception, encampment or entertainment of the National Guard, and there is no special inducement for military organizations to go there as such. It is not at all certain that a single military company will visit the fair as an organization. If Senator Mitchell's bill had passed, the benefit the National Guard would have received would have been very great. Even had the plan of supplying subsistence and tentage been carried out, a large number of militia would have gone, but, as it is, such of the National Guard as visit the fair would doubtless do so as peaceful citizens. Even the national troops will not be present, as the war department has decided not to send any troops nor the West Point battalion any cadets.
