OREGON STATE LEAGUE.

Meeting of Baseball Managers to formulate a schedule.

W. H. Kennedy and G. Forby of Portland, C. Kelley of Oregon City, C. W. Watts of Albany and M. J. Stanley managers of the respective local league clubs are in session at Salem today preparing a schedule of games for the season.

They will continue in session at Hotel Willamette this evening to elect officers of the league, appoint umpires, and complete further details of the state organization. The indications are that Oregon will have a very fine state league. Mat Stanley as manager of the home club, will meet with general approval.

W. O. T. U. Convention.

ASTORIA, May 11.—The Methodist Episcopal church was filled yesterday with delegates and members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, which began the real work of its annual convention at 9 o'clock in the morning. The state officers were all in attendance. Ten counties were represented by their presidents and delegates alone.

The state secretary of the Young Women's Christian Temperance Union was also present, with the state secretary of the Loyal Temperance Legion. The morning session was chiefly occupied with appointments and the reports of the various committees. The report of the state corresponding secretary showed that the number of Woman's Christian Temperance Unions reporting was 83, with a total state membership of 1951; the number of Young Woman's Christian Temperance unions 21, with a membership of 1951; and the number of Loyal Temperance Legions 39, with a membership of 1874. Three hundred and ten public meetings have been held in the state during the past year, and there have been 29 Demorest medal contests in the same time. A marble tablet in honor of the state president, Mrs. Anna R. Riggs, has been placed in the Temperance temple at Chicago during the past year, at a cost of \$100, subscribed by members of the union and friends of the cause in Oregon.

The treasurer, Mrs. Hattie J. Shane reported a surplus in the bank of \$132.04, after having paid bills amounting to \$459.53. The afternoon was taken up with devotional exercises and reports of county presidents. At the evening session Mrs. Narcissa W. Kinney delivered the address of welcome. Miss Rose Trumbull responded, and was followed by a speech from Miss Jessie Ackerman, the round-the-world missionary from Australia, who for nearly an hour held her audience delighted.

Arkansas City in Danger.

GREENVILLE, Miss., May 11.—The break in the levee at 1 o'clock this afternoon on the Arkansas side is over seven hundred feet wide. That portion of Arkansas is under water. It is reported that Arkansas City will be under water by night as the levee there cannot hold.

Two Sailors Drowned.

HALIFAX, May 11.—The steamer Havana, en route from Newfoundland via Sydney, when nine miles off Whitehead collided with the schooner J. A. Silver, of Lunenburg, bound to Canoe from the Banks Sunday evening. Two of the crew George Harris, of Lunenburg, and William Chrouse, of La Hav, were lost. The Havana arrived here yesterday afternoon, bringing the surviving members of the schooner's crew.

Defaulter Arrested.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—C. T. Gale, ex-treasurer of the city of Laramie, Wyo., was arrested here and will be held pending the arrival of officers from Laramie. Gale is a defaulter in \$12,000 and fled in April to Denver, thence to Mexico, thence to this city.

Forbidden Their Rights.

INNSBRUCK, May 11.—Count von Meyndt, governor of Tyrol and Vorarlberg, announced to the provincial diet that 16 of the Italo-Tyrol deputies had forfeited their right to sit as members of the diet by their continued absence from the sessions of the house.

Ribbon Factory Destroyed.

PARIS, May 11.—Colombet's ribbon factory in St. Etienne, department of the Loire, was burned. The loss is estimated at \$5,000,000 francs. Several firemen were injured.

Crop Shortage.

ROME, May 11.—Reports to the government from all parts of Italy show

that drought has so damaged crops as to be necessary to import 115,000,000 bushels of grain more than usual.

Crook Captured.

LEWIS, May 11.—It has been learned that John Curtin, the American crook, who was arrested a few days ago on a nominal charge of violating his ticket-of-leave, was really taken in custody to answer a charge made against him by the German authorities, of robbing a clerk of the sum of \$157,000. The robbery was committed while the clerk was entering a bank at Frankfurt. Curtin is well known by the American police.
