OREGON STATE LEAGUE.

Schedule of Baseball Between the League Clubs for 1893.

The baseball managers of the Oregon State league cities in convention met at the Willamette hotel last evening. There was also a meeting of local baseball men to organize a baseball club for Salem. Capt. M. W. Hunt was chosen temporary secretary. It was decided to meet May 12th to adopt a constitution and by-laws. A schedule for the entire season was prepared and adopted. It was also arranged that each city shall appoint its own umpires and the admission fee will be 25 cents for both ladies and gentlemen, ladies free to the grand stand. The league will be known as the "Oregon State League." They also elected permanent officers as follows: M. W. Hunt, president; Chas. Kelly, vice-president; P. B. Marshall, secretary; committee on constitution and by-laws, W. H. Kennedy, C. W. Watts, M. J. Stanley and Chas. Kelly. The first games of the season, to be played at Salem, will be on May 27th and 28th, the Oregon City boys playing here.

THE COLUMBIA FLOODS.

Big Snowfalls in Idaho—Portland Will Be Under Water Soon.

There will be high water this year, according to the observations taken by men who are qualified to know. Whether it will cause any serious damage will depend upon circumstances solely. The climatic conditions which have prevailed for the past six months cause many persons living in Portland and along the Lower Columbia to fear high water during the month of June. With a view to ascertaining the general conditions along the head and upper waters of the Columbia and Snake rivers and their tributaries, Overseer Pague, of Portland, has been in communication with his various correspondents for the past two weeks.

OF UNUSUAL DEPTH.
Among correspondents in mountainous districts the opinion is universal that the snow is of unusual depth in the mountains, and that all the streams will be higher than usual. Along the head and upper waters of the Columbia and other rivers there is more snow in the mountains than there has been for several years back. At John Day it is reported that the weather has been cold, and the snow still lies deep in the mountains, and lies lower down than has ever been heretofore. Not only is it the opinion of the people that there will be extraordinary high water, but serious floods. From two to five feet of snow in the mountains around Colville, Wash. The Colville river is higher now than it has been for 29 years.

Reports from British Columbia says that there is 10 feet of snow in the mountains there. The correspondent says to Mr. Pague that "your town will be largely under water," which laconic statement is most suggestive.

LOOKING FOR GREAT FLOODS.
Baker and Union counties will undoubtedly furnish far more water than for many years in June, writes an informant, and should warm weather come very suddenly we look for great floods. All people living along the Des Chutes river are making far more preparations this year than usual to protect their property from the rising waters. The postmaster at Halley, Idaho, writes:

"We have had the most snowfall in the last six months of any winter since the settling of this country by the whites. It seems to be the opinion of all oldtimers that we will have one of the worst floods ever known in this section. The weather continues cool, and it has been snowing and raining for the past 24 hours. Sudden hot weather will play havoc."
