NOT TRICHINAE.—County Stock Inspector W. L. Simeral was in the city today, and speaking of the case of sick hogs reported by him last winter, he said the stock in question had recently been imported from the East, and presented all the symptoms of the fatal disease. This he submitted to the state veterinarian, who now concludes that the hogs must have had either trichinae or rheumatic fever, favoring the belief that it was the latter. They were killed and buried.

CITY VIEW CEMETERY OPENED.

A Beautiful "City of the Dead" on the Hills Above Salem and the River.

Although of itself distasteful to many people, a public cemetery can often be made an attractive adjunct to any city. This is what is being undertaken by a company of enterprising Salem business men, who are looking after the beauty as well as the business interests of the capital city. We refer to the City View Cemetery association, recently organized and incorporated in our city, by such substantial citizens as E. C. Cross, W. H. Holmes, and J. P. Frizzell. About forty others have secured interests, and on the whole this can be looked upon as a solid and already prosperous organization.

The 22 acres lying south and west of the Odd Fellows' cemetery has been purchased and dedicated for this purpose. It is a high and slightly piece of ground overlooking the entire city, as well as the handsome Polk county hills, including the valley beyond, and the Coast Range in the far distance. This beautiful spot is reached by a winding road leading west at the south corner of the I. O. O. F. cemetery. It is easy of access, and the improvements about to be made are of such a nature that for attractiveness "City View" will rank with any cemetery in the state. Drives and walks in the most convenient form are being laid out, and will be graded. Water mains and hydrants will be introduced for the convenience of patrons wishing to introduce flowers and plants. Rare trees and shrubbery will be put out in abundance. In the center a circular half-acre lot has been purchased by

SEDGWICK POST, G. A. R., from and about which all the streets and walks will radiate and turn.

It is the purpose of the projectors to conduct the affairs of the new cemetery upon the well known and popular plan pursued by those having charge of the Riverside cemetery, at Portland, one of the best elements of which system, is the creation and maintenance of a sinking fund which accrues entirely to the use and benefit of the subsequent owners of the property (those buying and holding lots in same.) In the case here at home, 25 per cent. of the money turned in for lots in the "City View" cemetery, will be devoted to the establishment of such a fund, and a careful estimate of the probabilities, indicates that by the time the entire property is sold, this fund, independent of accruing interest, should amount to \$20,000. This advantage, coupled with the further wholesome provision that the property owners themselves elect their own officers, and direct the administration of the cemetery's affairs, is of vital and valuable importance to those who become investors in this new venture.

On the whole this project must meet with the approbation of all thinking men, as it not only adds a new business enterprise, but also a new and desirable attraction to our city. Cemetery property must surely prove a good investment, for we are all certain to get there sooner or later, and to know that it will be an attractive place can be no small consolation to all who journey thither.

At the annual meeting of Horse Breeders association of the Willamette Valley held at Salem, May 6th, resolutions were adopted as follows. All colts exhibited at this show must be entered with the secretary as follows.

Class 1, Colts sired by thoroughbred stallions.

Class 2, Colts sired by standard bred stallions.

Class 3, Colts sired by Oregon bred stallions of all work.

Class 4, Colts sired by Percheron stallions.

Class 5, Colts sired by English shire stallions.

Class 6, Colts sired by Clydesdale stallions.

Class 7, Colts sired by French and English coach and Cleveland Bay stallions.

Class 8, Colts sired by Grade Draft stallions.

This show consists of suckling colts sires and dams only. No charges made for entrance. Colts not entered are not considered in the show.

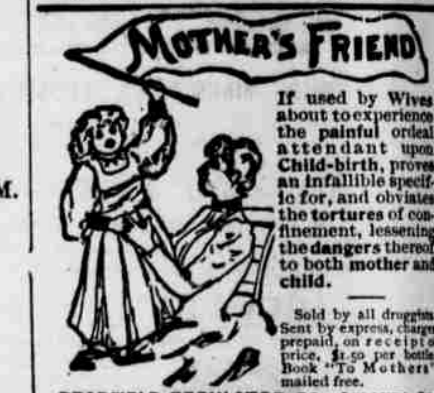
