

INSPIRING COLORS.

BRIGHT IN HUE AND CHEERING IN DAININESS.

Fashion Must Be Obedied, and Color, Harmony and Good Form Are Ever at Her Mercy—Some of the Skirts Shown Are Very Striking.

Verily the reign of terror has come, thinks the New York Sun fashion writer. The imperious "she who must be obeyed" in the domain of dress, exulting in her own success in devising atrocities, abjures moderation and revels in mania and absurdity. Daily we see our pet theories of color harmony, good form and gentility in dress guillotined in the streets.

Women go about the ordering of gowns in fear and trembling, wondering what the future will develop. However, sufficient unto the day is the mode thereof. There is comfort in the thought that the climax is not far off.

The new colors are bright and inspiring; even their daintiness is cheerful. Crude tints and dangerous combinations are seen, but a wise conservatism finds a great variety for choice in most artistic and fascinating tints.

A happy example of this conservatism, which adapts rather than follows the mode, is a summer gown of shot pea de soie rose and brown, with a clear green accent in the form of little figures in green. Three groups of ruffles trim the skirt at intervals of 10 inches, and each group of ruffles is formed of satin rib-

bon in the three tints of the gown—first the bronze, then the rose, and over these, almost covering them, is the frill of green. The waist is of green satin, with a peculiar arrangement of the goods draping from the shoulder to the belt, and bold epaulets of the green not ruffled, but cut with a great flare cap, and the full mutton leg sleeve, which finishes at the wrist with a broad cuff of satin. A little gimp combining the colors of the gown edges the folds of the waist and drapes across the bust. The collar and belt are of satin.

Another very simple gown is of a tender shade of gray green, suggestive of the tints in a coast landscape. The skirt is trimmed in a quaint old fashion with rows on rows of narrow fringe of the same color scarcely half a yard in width and put on in vandykes several rows in a group and covering the skirt nearly to the top. The waist is of cloth, edged with fringe, but the tint of the satin is deeper and more shadowy than the gown because it is shot with lines of color, rose and blue and pale yellow. These lines are so mixed in together that the individual effect of each is lost in a sheen of softly iridescent color.

Plainer and smarter than either of these gowns is a dress that promises to do duty at the fair. It is of the new hopsacking, whose name so aptly describes the peculiar canvaslike material, with its uneven threads. Very light and cool is this fabric and particularly suited to summer wear. Three black satin folds, with passementeries of black cord above like braiding, trim the skirt. The waist has three black satin capes crossing the shoulders, to be lost under revers of the satin, and in the space between is a vest of clear yellow cloth braided with black. The waist is joined to the skirt with a cord of black satin.

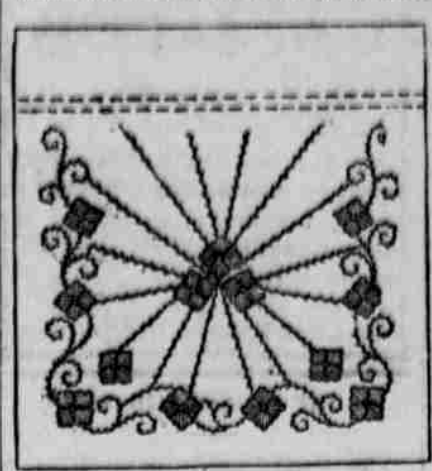
In the midst of all this shimmering color and rainbow dazzle a black dress has an air of distinction in quality to be desired. Such a gown of black crepon may have for a tall woman a skirt with the flare at the bottom part or in the form of a flounce, and where the flounce joins the skirt is a full broad ruche of satin ribbon 4 inches wide and plaited in deep triple plaits. The sleeves may be of green or mauve silk covered with black point d'esprit. The yoke effect is obtained by ruffling rows of black lace edging over silk the same tint as the sleeves, and from the belt bretelles of the satin ribbon are carried up to be plaited in the form of a ruche over the shoulder.

Chafing Dish Oysters. Take a good sized piece of butter and put it in the dish with some pepper and salt and a half tablespoonful of tobacco sauce. Allow this to melt; then add your oysters and a good quantity of chopped celery. Serve on toasted slices of bread.

THE SHOPPING BAG.

Suggestions For a Useful and Sensible Kind of Bag.

The most useful and sensible style of shopping bag, because the handiest and most commodious, is the kind which is made of the ordinary bag shape and hung over the arm by means of thin ribbons, which are let in some two or three inches

from the top, thus allowing the material above to form a full ruche when they are drawn together. It is therefore in the choice of material and manner of decorating them that taste and ingenuity can chiefly be displayed. The Ladies' Home Journal says. It should always be borne in mind that a bag thus carried must on no account be in the least intrusive in character and should be chosen to accord in color with the costume worn with it. Frequently a piece of the material of which the gown is made is employed either as the lining or the outside of the bag, which if intended for use on shopping excursions ought to be made large enough to hold pocketbook, handkerchief and sundry small packages, which are most conveniently carried home in this way.

The design here given in simple in character, but most effective, while very refined in style, if carried out in suitable coloring. It looks particularly well when intended to be used with a black costume to execute the design in two shades of dull red embroidery silk of the color which was known at the time of the Paris exposition under the title of eiffel red. Work the flowers solidly in the lighter shade and outline both centers and petals with the darker tone, which is also used for the curved and radiating lines which are rendered in brier stitch. The lining of the bag, which shows when it is closed by being drawn together at the month, may be of the deeper red. Double strings should be inserted, allowing sufficient size for the bag to hang at a convenient length from the arm, and if desired a good sized bow with ends may be sewn in the center of the band of ribbon which lies uppermost on the wrist when the bag is carried.

A Splendid Deodorizer.

One of the simplest disinfectants of the sickroom is ground coffee burned on the shovel, so as to fill the atmosphere of the room with its pungent aromatic odor. If two redhot coals are placed on a fire shovel, and a teaspoonful of ground coffee is sprinkled over them at a time, using three teaspoonfuls in all, it will fill the room with its aroma and is said to have the hygienic effect of preventing the spread of various epidemic diseases. The odor is very agreeable and soothing to a sick person, where other disinfectants prove disagreeable. Physicians who doubt the power of coffee as a disinfectant frequently recommend it as a deodorizer, and it is certainly one of the very best and most agreeable.

Directions For Improving the Complexion. If you want to improve a bad complexion, let your face alone, keep out of the drug store and don't doctor. Drink a glass of hot water an hour before dinner. If you are not hungry, work up an appetite. By work is meant work, not make believe. Drink wine if you can afford it. One glass at dinner with twice as much water is medicine of the best kind. Sweet milk is excellent. Lime-water may be added to make it more digestible. Sour milk is good. Everybody can drink lemonade. When tart, it is prime. Eat fruit after every meal. Bananas are poison in this section of the globe.

Strawberries are excellent for the complexion. Eat them by the quart, with or without sugar. Put cream on them or cake over them and you ruin everything. Ripe peaches, grapes and oranges are worth their weight in gold. Juicy apples are cheap at any price. About once a week—the day that your complexion shows bilious brown and yellow fever tints—take an early lunch or a late breakfast of 10 courses, consisting of eight sweet oranges and two slices of toast. Water at meals is very, very bad. In Paris, the cradle of good living, water is never sent to table excepting in finger bowls. Cold water chills the stomach. Digestion requires heat. If it is necessary to drink at meal times, and the best authority questions it, have mercy on the inner woman and use warm liquids—weak, red wine, tea, coffee, etc. Good soups are one of the best complexion foods, but a soup with noodles, dumplings and similar pasty things is not good. Oyster soup is good provided the oysters are saved for the ash cart. Candy is a hard thing to resist, but like spices, sauces and ices it is a foe to beauty. A succulent diet will cure pimples and eruptions. On the list are salad greens, beets, sprouts, tomatoes, onions, asparagus, and as the rhyming doctors sang of old:

With spinach and leek,
Lily cheeks in a week.

Cheese Toast. Cut slices of stale bread with a round cutter into cakes; toast them quickly. Put, for 12 persons, a half pound of grated cheese into a saucepan; add a teaspoonful of butter and a tablespoonful of tomato catsup; stir over the fire until melted. Put a teaspoonful over the top of each piece of toast and place on a napkin. Pass with the soup, allowing each guest to help one's self.

Beef Toast. Chop fine the remnants of boiled or roast beef, moisten with the broth or gravy, season with butter, pepper and salt and heat. Spread thickly upon slices of hot buttered toast and serve.

Being irregular in all habits of sleeping and eating too much, too many kinds of food and that which is too highly seasoned.

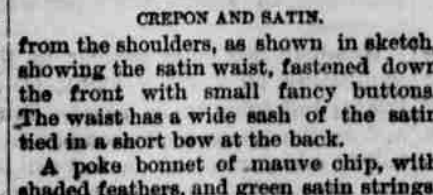
Neglecting to take proper care of ourselves and not applying early for medicinal advice when disease first appears, but by taking quack medicines to a degree of making a drug shop of the body.

Lemon Pudding.

Grate a pound of dry bread. Beat together 3 ounces of granulated sugar, 3 ounces of butter and the yolks of 3 eggs. Into this grate the rind of 2 lemons and beat the juice of 1, also a teaspoonful of vanilla. Pour over the crumbs 1 quart of milk and beat in the other ingredients. Bake half an hour in a buttered dish. Beat up the whites of your eggs very stiff with half a cupful of pulverized sugar and a little vanilla. Take the pudding out of the oven, put on the meringue and return to the oven until it is a light brown—which will be in about three minutes.

A Fashionable Gown.

This charming gown is composed of crepon and satin in the fashionable shades of mauve and green. The waist and full part of the sleeve are of satin, the crepon being gathered and draped

from the shoulders, as shown in sketch, showing the satin waist, fastened down the front with small fancy buttons. The waist has a wide sash of the satin tied in a short bow at the back.

A poke bonnet of mauve chip, with shaded feathers, and green satin strings, and a small bunch of lilacs under the brim, is a charming accompaniment to this gown:

5 yards crepon, 70c..... \$3.50
4 yards satin, 70c..... 2.80
3 yards ribbon, 40c..... 1.20
Lilacs, etc., \$3..... 1.00
Dressmaker, 5 days, at \$2.00..... 10.00
Total..... \$30.70

Bean Soup.

Use a quart of baking beans or black beans soaked over night. Turn off the water in the morning and add a gallon of cold water, a pound of salt pork cut in cubes, and an onion. Boil three or four hours with the pot covered. Add celery seed, pepper and salt. Strain and serve with slices of lemon.

Care of the Hands.

Here is a sure cure for rough, red, hard hands.
