OREGON SPORTSMEN AT WORK.

New Grounds—Annual Tournament—Medal Shoot.

The new shooting grounds of the Salem Rod and Gun club are now in good shape, and the boys have been doing some lively practice work on them for some days.

The first contest in the new quarters will be the regular medal shoot next Tuesday afternoon. It has already been captured seven times by Mr. Harritt, and another winning would make it his property. There will be a lively time next Tuesday to keep it out of his permanent possession for sometime to come, at least.

On the same date there will occur the first shoot for the Selby medal, donated by C. H. Glenn, to be contested for by the B class shooters. It is a medal won by Mr. Glenn at Seattle some years ago, and is offered to encourage the lesser lights of the shooting fraternity. It will probably be decided to give it to the man who wins it the most times during the season. A meeting will be held at Brooks & Salisbury's Monday night to perfect arrangements for this event, besides making rules for the same.

The program for the annual state tournament is now completed, and the local committee takes not a little pride in its merits and superior get up.

Y. M. C. A. ATHLETICS.

The hand ball tournament is drawing to the close and all the remaining games will be interesting.

The athletic committee are Mr. J. H. Albert, C. P. Bishop and F. E. Hodgkin. At a meeting of the committee on Wednesday an athletic park was the subject of discussion. Fine locations have been offered and some one of these will be accepted. The association expect to have a quarter mile bicycle track, baseball, football and tennis grounds within the track. Good material is in sight for one or more baseball teams which will be organized as soon as the park is ready for use.

A field day in June is now almost assured fact. The Pentathlon plan will probably be adopted and consists of five events with a possibility of 500 points 100 yards dash. Throwing 12 lb hammer. Running high jump. Pole vault one mile run. Other interesting entries will be made. In order to obtain 500 points, the 100 yard dash must be made in 10 2-5 seconds. The hammer thrown 100 feet. High jump 5-6 feet. Pole vault 10 feet high. Mile run in five minutes.

Several members of the bicycle club took a run to Silver Creek Falls last Saturday and report a fine time in spite of a few miles of rough roads. The cycle meter registered just 65 miles, the trip back was made in three hours and forty minutes.

Runs for a month ahead will soon be planned so the fellows may know what to expect.

THE CHINESE SITUATION.

The people await anxiously to see how far the Geary law is going to be enforced. There is no way to check the incoming tide of Chinese, via British Columbia but by an extremely rigid photographic registration. No American can travel in China, Japan or even Europe for that matter without a passport. This is the only country in the world where foreigners can come and go about Scott free. The Chinese are not consumers of American food products when they are here, they send for their food, clothes and everything to China, they send their money there, they are a parasite, a barnacle, sucking the life-blood out of our country, and making it impossible for a white laborer to get bread for his family or employment for himself or his children. The people are entitled to have the Geary law fairly and fully enforced.

Some of our Democratic friends are thinking THE JOURNAL has been too severe on the administration. They are not as good in their Democracy as THE JOURNAL is, that is all. There is a very fair comment from a Democratic paper, the Portland Telegram. This is what it says of the president's duty about the Geary law:

"His duty is as plain as daylight, which is to enforce the law as vigorously as it is possible to do. There is but a small appropriation available, yet the credit of the United States government is sufficient to supply any deficiency that may exist. The money can be had, and can be had on short notice, to carry the law into effect."

"President Cleveland made a mistake in attempting to suspend any portion of the law. He did it with good intent but his judgment was at fault. His hesitation to enforce the law promptly no doubt encouraged the Six Companies into a course that amounts to little less than actual rebellion against the authority of the United States. These alien multitudes must be taught a lesson of obedience, and the president will recover his lost ground by immediately proceeding to do it. So far there has been nothing in the president's action which to hinge impeachment proceedings, but a continuous and persistent refusal to execute a law that has been declared constitutional by the highest judicial tribunal might invite impeachment. It is of more importance to the people of this country to have the laws observed than it is to be catering to the whims of the Chinese emperor."

"Amen! That is very good Republican doctrine."

DANDY JIM CORBETT.

Sullivan's Sluggo Passes an Opinion on the Capital City.

A special compartment car containing Jas. Corbett, pugilist, was attached to the 11:15 train as it drew into Salem over the Southern Pacific. "Ah! Ahem? This is Salem is it?"

The train was at the station. As a crowd was surging around the car.
