THE COUNTY BILLS.—The claims acted upon by the county court are presented in this issue. The law requires their publication in two newspapers, but as the county court only allows one cent per square for doing so they are not published in any other paper but *THE JOURNAL*, which is not dependent upon official patronage for its existence. This list shows what bills are rejected or out by the court as well as those allowed, and that is information the people want. It will be seen that the big item is remodeling the circuit court room, while the bills of the clerk and sheriff are not in the list.

NOW FOR THE FLOWERS.

The Rose Fair Progressing Finely—Officers Selected.

At a meeting of the floricultural society at the Hotel Willamette yesterday afternoon further arrangements were made for the successful outcome of the rose show. Mrs. Wm. Brown was unanimously selected as manager of the show, with power, as president of the society, to call upon any of its members for assistance. She assumes the burdensome duty with this understanding, and will prove an efficient officer. Mrs. H. W. Cottle and Mrs. A. I. Wagner were appointed a committee on booths, and Mrs. J. F. Babcock and Mrs. C. M. Parmenter were made a committee on music. An adjourned meeting will be held at the hotel Monday next at 2 p. m. to hear committee reports and perfect all arrangements. Everybody is invited to attend.

The dates set for the fair are June 9th and 10th, and it will probably be held at the armory as in the past. All exhibits are to be completed by the evening of the 9th, and everyone interested in the success of the fair or the culture of flowers is invited to be present.

The management of the coming rose show wish it fully understood that all having roses are invited to bring them to the show, either for display, or to enter for premiums. No entry fee is charged. The hope is to raise sufficient funds at this first show to enable them to offer more substantial premiums than ribbons at their next year's flower shows. They earnestly desire the help of all lovers of flowers and all gardeners, cut flowers or pot plants of any description will be very welcome as an addition to the general display. The Salem Floricultural society is open to all and the few who have taken the lead in its organization request all who have an interest in such matters to come and join us and by our society meetings and occasional flower shows the growth and love of flowers will be stimulated, which will in time beautify to a great extent, the naturally beautiful city we all call home.

THE NEW CITY HALL.

Members of the Committee Report on Pioneer Stone.

The special committee of the city council who went over to Yaquina Bay to investigate the merits of the Pioneer quarry stone returned today and report having had some good fishing, and learned a whole lot about the merits of that building stone. They are enthusiastic about it and talked freely to a *JOURNAL* writer about it. Alderman Cross only got back this afternoon. The other two gentlemen speak about as follows:

Gray: "It is first-class rock and easily got out. The layers are four to six feet thick. We saw a chimney built outdoors eight years that was as good as when put in. We have made no tests, but will send a sample to Portland to be tested. Also a piece will be put in the ice works to freeze."

Klein: "We examined the stone and found it better than we expected. We have brought samples that were exposed to the weather for 12 years and are as good today as when taken out. A government test and a hydraulic test will be made as soon as possible. Fireplaces were shown us made of this stone years ago, as good as when put in."

The Oregon Pacific extended every courtesy to the Aldermen and are anxious to develop the quarry.

To get the benefit of their experience the time for receiving bids will have to be extended from June 6th to 20th, as the council ordered. The city hall committee had no right to ask for bids on the 6th, giving two weeks between receiving the bids and submitting them to the council.

There are so few contractors here able to give bonds and carry so large a contract, and carry the city as will have to be done that an advertisement should be placed at Portland. These matters should be called up and disposed of at the meeting of the council tonight.
