REDUCED FARE.—The Southern Pacific  
lines have consented to give to  
those attending the State Sportsmen's

27th to 29th round trip transportation at  
one and one-third regular fare.  
They will pay full fare going to Salem.  
They will get a certificate from the sec-  
retary at Salem, and on presentation to  
agent at Salem will get a return ticket  
at one third fare. Parties returning to  
points on the narrow gauge, W. S.  
division, and Portland and Yamhill  
railway and on West Side division will  
require two certificates, one to present at  
Salem and one to present at junction  
point with branch line. Certificates  
are valid after June 30th.

## WAGON ROADS.

Meeting to Consider the Necessity  
and to Take Steps Towards Build-  
ing Good Roads Leading to  
Salem.

On May 17th a large meeting of the  
prominent business men of this city  
was held at the State Insurance Com-  
pany's office to consider the necessity  
for, and to take such steps as may be  
necessary for the improvement of the  
wagon roads leading to Salem, under  
the new law. This law, which was  
passed at the last session of the legisla-  
ture on the 22d of February, 1893, pro-  
vides, that, "where a majority of the  
resident land holders of the county  
whose lands are within three miles of  
the proposed improvement present a  
petition to the county court of  
any county, stating the kind of im-  
provement asked for and the points be-  
tween which the same is asked, the  
said county court, if it be satisfied that  
the proposed improvement would be of  
public utility, may appoint three dis-  
interested householders of the county  
viewers, and a competent surveyor or  
engineer, to proceed, on a day named by  
the county court, to examine, view, lay  
out, straighten, or change such road as  
in their judgment public utility or  
convenience requires; and if the said  
viewers find that such improvement  
will be of public utility or convenience,  
and that the costs and expenses thereof  
and damages thereby will be less than  
the benefits of the lands within three  
miles of such improvements, they shall  
upon actual view of all lands within 3  
miles of the improvement, apportion  
the estimated costs, expenses, and dam-  
ages upon all the said lands within said  
three miles that are benefited, accord-  
ing to the benefits to be derived there-  
from. They shall also assess the dam-  
ages, if any, sustained by any person  
or persons through whose land said  
road is proposed to be laid out, straight-  
ened, changed or improved. These  
assessments (upon land within three  
miles of said road proposed to be im-  
proved) when confirmed by the court  
shall constitute a first lien on the real  
estate respectively assessed, which lien  
shall relate back and bind the real es-  
tate so assessed from the time of the  
filing of the petition.

After the improvement has been or-  
dered and the assessments confirmed,  
the court shall let the contract for the  
construction of the work as a whole or  
in parcels as it may deem best upon  
proper notice, etc.

All work on said improvements shall  
be done under the supervision of the  
roadmaster of the county or any other  
competent person of the county ap-  
pointed by the county court. As soon  
as the contract or contracts are let for  
the construction of the work, the su-  
perintendent shall assess upon all the  
lands benefited, ratably upon the  
amount of benefits as confirmed and  
adjudged by the county court, such  
sum as may be necessary to pay for the  
work and all costs and expenses accrued  
and to accrue, not exceeding the whole  
benefits adjudged upon any tract. The  
county treasurer shall thereupon exe-  
cute certificates which certify the sum  
assessed against each tract of land re-  
spectively that the same is to be paid in  
ten equal installments in one, two,  
three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine  
and ten years from the date of the cer-  
tificate, and that the whole amount of  
the certificate may be paid at any time  
by the owner of the land against which  
the assessment is made. Such certifi-  
cate shall bear interest at the rate of  
eight per cent per annum, and if any  
installment is not paid when due the  
whole certificate shall become due and  
payable. Such certificate may be paid  
out by the county treasurer on a war-  
rant ordered by the county court in  
payment for any labor performed on  
said road improvement as he may ne-  
gotiate and sell such certificate at not  
less than par value thereof, and the  
proceeds of said sale shall be kept by  
the treasurer as a separate fund to be  
used only in payment of the expenses  
of said improvement, and shall be paid  
out by him only on a warrant drawn  
on said improvement fund by order of  
the county court.

This is the substance of the law  
passed, as above stated. Under this  
law whenever a majority of the resi-  
dent land owners within three miles of  
any road, desirous, they can have said  
road improved and made so that it is  
a good substantial road, free from mud  
in winter and dust in summer, and  
have ten years to pay for the same.

Hon. John G. Wright was elected  
chairman of the meeting, and A. I.  
Wagner secretary.

The following resolutions were offered  
and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That it be the sense of the  
meeting that the citizens of Salem are  
heartily in favor of good roads being  
constructed from this city and various  
parts of the county and to Polk county,  
and will render substantial assistance  
towards the same.

A resolution was also offered and  
unanimously adopted favoring the  
thorough draining of all roads by means  
of tiling placed at each side of the grade  
so as to drain the water out from under  
the road and keep it dry.

It was also the sense of the meeting  
that, after this be done, the road be  
graded up between the tiles and covered  
with fine gravel or crushed rock, and  
that this grade be not made too wide.  
The prevailing idea seemed to be to  
make it narrow, in view of the fact  
that winter roads are needed more than  
any other, and that by making it nar-  
row and having it well-rounded, it  
would drain off to the sides where it  
would go down into the tile and be car-  
ried off, keeping it in first-class shape  
throughout the year.

This meeting, which was largely at-  
tended by substantial citizens of Salem,  
was very enthusiastic in regard to the  
advisability and necessity of taking  
hold of this work, and pushing it to a  
complete success. It means much for  
the good of this city. It was shown  
that in Ohio, Indiana, and elsewhere,  
where such roads have been made, that  
they create a demand for property along  
the line of these roads at much higher  
figures than were obtainable before,  
the productive value of the farm in dol-  
lars and cents being very largely in-  
creased. It was shown that by means  
of these roads the farmer could market  
his produce any day in the year; that  
there would be an immense saving in  
horses, wagons, harness, repairs, etc.;  
in fact, it seems to be the consensus  
of opinion that no movement could be  
taken which would result in so great  
good to both country and city as the  
building of good roads.

After a thorough discussion as to the  
best means for the accomplishment of  
this work, a committee was appointed  
consisting of H. W. Cottle, Wm.  
Brown and Geo. M. Beeler, to draw up  
a brief synopsis of the new law, as  
above set forth, and to prepare an es-  
timate of the cost of constructing roads  
in the above described manner, and  
make an estimate of the cost of said  
roads to each acre of land within the  
district. On motion the meeting ad-  
journed on call of the chairman.
