BIGGEST DEMONSTRATION EVER HELD

At the Capital City in Honor of the Heroic Dead.

Salem is a loyal city. This is always shown by the way the people observe Memorial day. This day was observed yesterday in its true spirit. Houses and places of business were draped in the national colors. Flags flew at half mast on the state house and other public buildings. It was decidedly a family day of observance. Houses were closed, business was suspended and fathers, mothers, children and all turned out to spend the day, see the procession, hear the music, see the sights and carry flowers to the cemetery.

THE MILITIA made a fine appearance, in their neat uniforms and excellent maneuvering. Led by the Second Regiment band they headed the column of two hundred veterans of Sedgwick post, G. A. R. This was followed by the veterans of the Indian war, the Sons of Veterans, the Harrison Institute cadets, and veterans and Women's Relief Corps in electric cars.

RURAL CEMETERY was reached soon after 2 p. m. and the ritual of the grand army, including depositing of flowers on the graves in the name of each veteran's company and regiment, the ladies depositing their beautiful baskets of flowers about a monument to the unknown dead. The Indian War veterans decorated the graves of their own dead. The ceremonies closed with firing the customary salute.

A BANQUET was spread at the G. A. R. hall by the ladies of the Relief Corps and it was a genuine surprise. The bountiful supply of good things was washed down with a brand of xxx army coffee that cleared the throats of the tired trampers through four miles of dust, and put all in a merry mood. They fed "The entire procession" from end to end, old and young, and were given three hearty cheers for their splendid Memorial day lunch.

AT THE OPERA HOUSE. The decorations were profuse. Flowers and flags festooned enshrined the stage in a halo of colors. The members and officers of Sedgwick post G. A. R. occupied seats on the stage, the Women's Relief Corps sitting in a body next to the foot lights. Those Reynolds was floor manager and seems to be equally popular with all branches of the grand army. Commander Crossan escorted Rev. Hutchinson of the First Presbyterian church to the platform and he delivered the opening prayer. Mrs. R. E. Wanda and President Jones of the relief corps were escorted to the stage by Commander Crossan who acted as master of ceremonies. Geo. P. Sanderson presided in a dignified manner and the regular program was carried out. He showed that the people of the whole nation took a part in observing Memorial day. He thanked the school teachers and scholars for observing the day. He was warmly applauded and called on all to arise and sing "America" which was done with a vim.

Mrs. Wanda recited "The Army of the Dead" in a very spirited and pathetic style of delivery that held all entranced. The double quartet rendered "Marching Through Georgia." Rev. S. P. Adams then delivered the address of the evening. It was a solid and unanswerable argument for a more just estimate of the unselfish patriotic services of the Union soldiers. He showed that the private who served his country and returned home to continue an unequal battle for life was as much a hero as the general shot on field of battle.

NOTES. The day was perfect. The children were all out, loyal as ever. The Capital Electric car line carried 4000 people. Bunko Skinner took in the sights at the cemetery. The address at the opera house was good—the Memorial Day part. If the Grand Army organizations can hold such a grand demonstration

GETTING A BEAT IN A STREET CAR.

A Stout Woman's Clever Trick Failed Once, and Everybody Laughed.

The builders of street cars allow for 11 seats on each side. This was the allotment when the cars were first introduced. Since that time the average area of the citizen has materially increased in person—both women and men are larger. The chance introduction of young people and children still permits 11 people on a side, but with a full complement of passengers Nos. 21 and 22 must stand. This increase of girth on the part of New Yorkers in limiting the accommodations of the car obliges frequently somebody to yield what was once considered the right to a seat.
