SEVEN SEATS OF LEARNING.

Will Contest for Prizes in Oratory at Salem.

The first state inter-collegiate oratorical contest will be held this evening at the First Methodist church of Salem. The Albany college, the Monmouth normal school, the Pacific university, of Forest Grove, the Pacific college, of Newberg, the Willamette university, of Salem, the Oregon state university, of Eugene, will all send delegates and a representative to contest for the prize.

Portland university and the State Agricultural college, of Corvallis, have sent delegates but no one to contest for the prize. They expect, however, to send some one to contest after this year. Each institution is entitled to eight delegates, but a greater number than this will go from most of the schools.

There are two sets of judges, one set to pass upon the literary excellence of the paper and the other set to judge as to the delivery. Those who judge the literary excellence are Judge Bean, Rev. Knight of Salem, and Rev. Whitaker of Salem. Each oration was sent to these judges two weeks ago under a nom de plume. The judges of delivery are B. B. Beckman, of Portland, Rev. Brown, of Portland, and Rev. Kellerman, of Salem.

A 35-dollar gold medal will be given to the winner. C. E. Henderson of the senior class, has been chosen to represent the State university. The following have been selected as delegates: E. H. Lauer and Harry Hopkins, of the senior class; E. M. Underwood and I. M. Glen, of the junior class; Frank Matthews and Miss Laura Beatty, of the sophomore class, Fred Mulky and C. N. Keene, of the freshman class. Prof. Carson has been chosen by the faculty to represent that body at the contest.

Contents of this kind are of much practical value, since they stimulate the students to greater effort; and then they bring the institutions of learning of the state closer together and do much for the cause of education in general.

THE PROGRAM.

The exercises begin this evening at 8 o'clock in the M. E. church. The Monmouth students will come by river excursion and be accompanied by their band. All the schools will be represented by good delegations and the church will be crowded to hear and encourage the young orators. The following is the program:

An admission of twenty-five cents will be charged.

A KELLERMAN VERSION.

Of His Memorial Day Denunciation of Pensioners and the Grand Army.

No far no other Salem newspaper has discovered anything to criticize in Rev. Kellerman's Memorial Day sermon.

Of course, the Democrat applauds it. It was delivered to tickle the ear of the pension-hating politicians whose chief petty stock in trade is to attack the Grand Army.

Rev. Hutchison and other ministers delivered Memorial Day sermons on the same Sunday. But nowhere was the occasion made use of to abuse the Grand Army or impugn the patriotism of a single veteran. It remained for a Frumman importation in an otherwise universally loyal pulpit to descend to the low level of a copperhead politician and insult the Grand Army organization and asperse the patriotic motives of the volunteers of the Union army.

But we do not wish to condemn Rev. Kellerman unheard. Following is printed in one of the Salem papers that is defending his course of action. It will be seen that it is printed as "not given voluntarily by Rev. Kellerman." The facts seem to be that the gentleman spoke from notes and had not written out his remarks so as to read them from manuscript. If that is true the impression his remarks made on his hearers would be a far more reliable test of the spirit of his utterances than a revised version of his sermon prepared afterward.

THE REVISED VERSION.

Salem Independent: "The following is a synopsis of the sermon preached by Rev. Kellerman, over which certain parties have endeavored to gain notoriety. This synopsis was obtained by us and not given voluntarily by Rev. Kellerman. It shows just what he did say upon the subject of pension:

"The present state of the pension business is one of the most iniquitous things in our national life. The amount of fraud committed is enormous. The false swearing that is done, and the false affidavits which are made to secure pensions for undeserving persons is awful, and has a debasing effect upon the old soldiers implicated, the morals of communities, and depreciates patriotism in the rising generation. Right after war, (those of us who can remember back that far remember it very well), when the government voted pensions to the soldiers who had saved the union, many old soldiers ridiculed the idea of accepting a pension. They had lost an arm or a leg, or had been wounded in some vital part, but they were proud of it, they had done it for the country they loved. This was the noblest patriotism. But pension agents and demagogues saw an opportunity to enrich themselves out of the soldiers and they urged them everywhere to accept pensions. Other laws were passed from time to time and the lists were extended, until now persons, twenty, twenty-five and thirty years after the war, when the infirmities of age naturally manifest themselves, a great many attempt to trace these disabilities to service in the war to secure a pension. They had perhaps received a thousand dollars bounty, and had served but six months or a year, and never saw a battle, nor got beyond the barracks to which they were sent after enlistment, and now they clamor for a pension. But do not understand me to say that the veterans who saved the country are not worthy of all honor and care that a gratified country can bestow; they are. But these others suggest the anomaly of the soldiers turning around and sacking the country which they defended and saved. Patriotism is the love of country, the sacrifice of self for the country's good, and must manifest itself in time of peace as well as in time of war."

REMYNY'S FAVORITES.

Of all the popular American airs, the favorites of Edouard Remyeny, the great violinist, are "Swanee River" and "Dixie." It recently came to the notice of Mr. Remyeny that the author of "Dixie," Mr. Dan Emmett, was living in poverty in an obscure town in Ohio. The fact so touched the heart of the genial genius, that he immediately set about to raise a fund for his relief, and started it himself with a contribution of \$50.00. That a man who could compose "Dixie" should live in poverty in enlightened America is something unaccountable.
