CADET EXAMINATIONS.—Prof. E. B. McElroy, state superintendent of public instruction, Hon. S. F. Chadwick and Dr. W. A. Cusick, of Salem, have been appointed by Congressman Binger Hermann to serve as an examining board for applicants to the appointment as cadets to the Annapolis Naval academy and the military school at West Point, there being a vacancy from this district. THE CROSS ROAD LAW.

Opinion of Judge Meldrum That it is Practically Useless.

County Judge Hubbard has just received a letter from the county judge of Clackamas county as to the working of the Cross road law. It is barely possible that there may be parts of the well cultivated Salem prairies where this law can be made to operate. But it looks as though this was one of those self-operative laws with a killing clause. Here is the letter:

JUDGE MELDRUM'S OPINION.

Hon. W. C. Hubbard: Your letter of the 25th inst. inquiring about the new law, known as the "Cross Bill," is received. As you are aware, the bill was drawn by myself, and you also know that I took a great interest in securing its passage through the legislature.

Although I watched it closely through most of the stages of its passage, I could not remain in Salem during the session, and I did not know, until I received the printed laws of the session, that it had been amended, (that is what the solons in the house committee on roads and highways called it) and thus rendered practically useless until another legislature will restore the amended section of the law to its original form or to something very similar to it.

The so-called amendment above referred to, is in section 2, of the act. The law, as passed, requires a petition, signed by a majority of the resident land owners whose lands are within three miles of the proposed improvement, to give the court jurisdiction in the matter. This majority will be difficult to obtain in a country of such topographical features as those generally prevailing in Oregon, and should not be required, for the reason that it gives a voice, in the first instance, to every resident land owner within the three miles limit, although in nearly every case there will be a great many of them whose lands are so situated as to receive no benefit from the proposed improvement; they will not be assessed to make it, and they should not have any voice at all in the matter, at any stage of the proceedings. The bill, as originally drawn, required only the signature of twelve resident land owners, whose lands are within three miles of the improvement, to a petition to bring the matter before the court. Then the view, survey and appraisal would show just what lands are affected, and there is a provision, in a subsequent section, allowing the owners of the lands against which more than half the assessments for benefits are made, by remonstrance, to defeat it.

In any situation where this majority can be obtained to a petition to bring the matter within the jurisdiction of the court, the law is operative, I have no doubt, and if this section 2 should be changed back to the original bill the law would be a little better than that of either of the other states on this subject. WOMAN KIDNAPPED.

Chinese Highbinders Get Away With a Jap's Wife.

Salem was the scene of a first-class kidnapping affair Sunday. Two Chinese highbinders committed the crime at 2 a. m.

Murakami, a young Japanese, went to the Chinese restaurant to get some meals for two Japanese women, one his wife, aged 22. Her name is Masa.

Two Chinese had a team back of Hong Sing's laundry on corner Ferry and High. As soon as he was gone they rushed into the back door, pulled Masa, or Mrs. Murakami, out of her bed, wrapped her in a blanket, bundled her into a top carriage and fled with her. Last seen of them they were crossing the big bridge for Polk county on a dead gallop.

Murakami says he has been here a year. He brought two women over from Japan two months ago and they came to Salem a few days ago. The women cannot talk at all. These Japs cannot make themselves understood, except through an interpreter. Papers were made out today for the arrest of the two unknown villains. Prosecuting Attorney Condit has charge of the legal aspects of the case and Chief of Police Minto is on track of the culprits.
