### SALEM IMPROVEMENT CO.

Fix the Grounds.—The appearance of the trees, walks and grounds about our beautiful court house is not at all creditable to the conspicuous location of that public building in the center of the city. Over a thousand dollars has recently been spent in beautifying the interior of the circuit court room, upon petition of a few attorneys, and for the convenience of the judges, jurors, lawyers and criminals, who assemble there twice a year. Less than that sum would trim the trees, put fine cement walks about the square, grade the grounds, put out some ornamental shrubbery and make the whole bear a more respectable and metropolitan appearance. There should be fountains for man and beast in place of rills and mudholes stamped in the ground. The city would cheerfully bear the expense of beautifying this public property. It is the most valuable piece of property Marion county has and its exterior is quite as deserving of some attention as its interior. Plans for the improvement of the court house square should be solicited by those in authority and all should help to make it a success.
