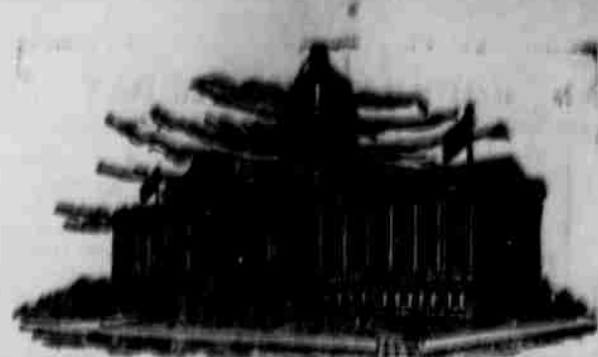

Ohio.

THE REPUBLICAN LEADER FOR PRESIDENT

Lays Down His Declaration of
Principles.

Governor's Address.

COLUMBUS, O., June 8.—Temporary Chairman Hon. Charles Grosvenor, on assuming his duties, delivered an extended address, chiefly devoted to the tariff, giving the probable keynote for the platform with McKinley as a presidential candidate. He dwelt on the wisdom of the McKinley bill, the number of articles which came in free under it, while at the same time protecting American industries, and declared if the Democrats attempted to pass an ad valorem tariff they would have to make the rate 80 per cent. all around, leaving nothing on the free list. He attributed the present hard times not so much to the silver problem as to the apprehension that the Democrats will carry out their pledge in regard to upsetting the tariff. He declared that protection and reciprocity were the twin causes of American prosperity.

SENATOR SHERMAN'S LETTER.

Senator Sherman, writing from Washington, said matters of business prevented his intended presence at the convention. He added that he scrupulously abstained from any interference in the selection of candidates and the adjustment of principles. He believed this duty could be best performed by the delegates assembled in convention. He said fortunately public opinion seems to have concentrated in favor of the renomination of the candidates selected two years ago, giving a special good word for Governor McKinley. The letter then touched on desirable legislation for Ohio, and concluded with a review of the achievement of the Republican party, declaring it has engrained its principles in the laws of the country to the latter's great advantage as a free and prosperous nation.

In contrast with this, he said, the Democratic party and a Democratic president could not agree on or formulate a single affirmative measure of public policy, nor even on how or where to attack any measure of the Republican party. In view of this, it should be the pride and pleasure of Ohio Republicans to take the lead in the coming election in reviving the enthusiasm of old times.

COLUMBUS, June 8.—Governor McKinley today received the laurels of success and a preface, perhaps of higher honors to come. The great protectionist in accepting the nomination as a Republican candidate for governor of Ohio, virtually outlined a declaration of principles by which he may be judged as a candidate for the presidency. After the convention had been called to order, the duke of Veragua and party entered the hall amid loud applause.

At this juncture Colonel Robert Nevin in an eloquent address nominated McKinley for governor. The nomination was made by acclamation. While waiting for the committee to bring McKinley in, Lieut-Governor Harris was also re-nominated by acclamation. Then McKinley entered amid an outburst of applause and taking the platform delivered his speech of acceptance. In opening he said: "The nomination is an honor and one which imposed a duty. He might forego the honor, but could not refuse the duty."

He reviewed at length the financial situation saying: "Was it to be wondered that people distrust, especially in view of the fact that the administration has put forth no line of financial policy? (Cleveland says the Sherman silver bill is the cause of depression, but does not convene congress to repeal it. While waiting for Democrats to carry out the declarations in their platform on the tariff, the country's business is paralyzed because of uncertainty. If expectation of what Democrats would do has destroyed confidence, what will the full realization do? But the Democratic party is divided into factions and split sunder on the tariff, and currency issues. That do-nothing policy must be the result. The only direction to look for relief is to the Republican party." The speaker then took up the pension frauds question saying he did not object to striking unworthy pensioners from the rolls, but declared the ruling of the secretary of the interior would result in striking from the pension rolls thousands of worthy, dependant soldiers.

Three Million Fire at Fargo.

FARGO, N. D., June 8.—Exact figures of last night's big fire are not yet obtainable. Nearly three thousand people are homeless, as many more are out of work. All hotels except headquarters, all banks except First National, all groceries except two, all society halls, all machinery warehouses except Walter A. Woods and Monitor Drill are destroyed. Fire companies are here from Grand Forks, Jamestown, Casselton and other neighboring towns, but flames are still burning fiercely. The fire made a clean sweep of twelve blocks long and five blocks wide. At least half the business part of the city is in ruins. The Great Northern trestle burned. Flames blocked traffic on the Northern Pacific. The Western Union building is destroyed and telegraph wires badly demoralized.

American Bicyclist.

DUBLIN, June 8.—A. A. Zimmerman, the American champion bicyclist, was winner in a mile invitation scratch race, participated in by bicyclists from various parts of Ireland. The time was two minutes and forty-seven and two-fifths seconds. Later in the day there was a race for the twenty-five mile championship. Of twenty wheelmen who started, three fell in the first lap. Zimmerman at an early stage of the race came in collision with another contestant and was thrown with great violence. Three of his teeth were crushed out and he was otherwise injured to such an extent that he was compelled to retire from the race.

Yellow Fever in Costa Rica.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The marine hospital service has received a telegram, transmitted through the department of state, from the United States consul at San Jose, Costa Rica, stating that a yellow fever epidemic prevails at Limon, Costa Rica. The surgeon-general at once notified by telegraph the health officers at Savannah, Mobile, Charleston, New Orleans and Jacksonville, Fla., and the officer in charge of the Gulf quarantine station.

Exploding Naphtha.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 8.—An explosion of naphtha in the drug store of Knappenburger & Painter, caused a fire which damaged the stock and building to the extent of about \$3000, fully covered by insurance.

West Virginia's Cyclone.

BRISTOL, W. Va., June 8.—The two men wounded in the cyclone were Major H. Clintwood, Republican candidate for congress on that ticket two years ago, and J. P. Roder, a member of Bristol's city council. The damage to property is estimated at \$100,000.

Nebraska Day.

CHICAGO, June 8.—A unique program was observed today in opening the Nebraska state building. The past and present were brought together face to face. Tribes of Indians, whose ancestors had hunted deer and buffalo on the wide prairies of that state, rubbed elbows with distinguished citizens of that commonwealth, and the utmost good feeling prevailed.

For Sunday Closing.

CHICAGO, June 8.—In the United States circuit court today Judges Jenkins and Wood delivered decisions favoring closing of the World's fair gates on Sunday, and Judge Grosscup filed a dissenting opinion, holding the injunction should not issue in behalf of the world's fair. The appeal is taken to the United States supreme court.

Heavy Dry Goods Failure.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., June 8.—D. B. Loveman, the leading dry goods merchant has failed, and given Hon. H. Clay Evans, a deed of trust to all his property, valued at \$350,000. Preferred creditors hold claims aggregating \$120,000. The amount of unsecured liabilities is unknown, but heavy.

Gasoline Explosion.

ST. LOUIS, June 8.—A tank of gasoline exploded in Samuel Reeper's grocery store, on the first floor of a tenement house occupied by a number of families. Sixteen people were more or less seriously burned or injured by broken glass and debris. Three are not expected to live.

Lowest Prices in History.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 8.—On the board of trade today wheat touched the lowest point ever reached in the history of this market. Cash wheat sold at sixty-three. The entire trade is exceedingly bearish.

Big Fire Loss.

ONKOR, Wis., June 8.—Many buildings on Main street and Jefferson Avenue were destroyed by fire this afternoon. Loss estimated \$200,000.

Debate On Home Rule.

LONDON, June 8.—There was a hot debate in the house of commons on the amendment proposed by the opposition to amend the Irish home-rule bill by inserting among the questions which the Irish parliament shall not have power to deal with that of the right to expel aliens. Gladstone accepted the amendment and it was adopted after strong protests by the Irish nationalists, who voted against it, but the conservatives voted for it and prevailed. The clause was finally modified, however, by making it read "aliens as such."

English Comment.

LONDON, June 8.—In its financial article this morning the Times says: "It may be safely assumed that the Sherman law will be repealed by the end of the year. The act has proven to be an expensive experiment which no nation but America could stand without involving itself in much more serious trouble. The mischief already done cannot be repaired quickly, but the attitude of suspicion so long maintained by investors and speculators toward American railroads is likely to be gradually modified."
