OREGON PIONEERS.

The 20th annual reunion of this association will be held in the exposition building Portland, Oregon, Thursday, June 15, '93. Annual address, Hon. W. L. Butler, Dallas; occasional address, Hon. The Pioneer ladies of Portland will prepare an excellent collation to be served in the restaurant adjoining the music hall, exposition building, from 5:30 to 8. THE LICENSING ORDINANCE.

Proposition to Tax Every Business in the City of Salem.

The city council is considering an ordinance of a very sweeping character. Some time ago the present license statute of this city was referred to a committee for purpose of revision, as it has some grave defects.

In addition to saloons, auctioneers, hotel runners, backs, bill posters, now licensed, a license is required as follows per year.

- Laundry, \$25, hotels and boarding houses, \$5 to \$10.
- Druggists, grocers, butchers, jewelers, hardware, stoves and tinware, lumber, clothing, furniture, boot and shoe,—all kinds of retail or mercantile business \$5 to \$25.
- Livery stables, \$10 to \$15.
- Real estate dealers, \$10.
- Telegraph companies, \$100.
- Contractors, \$10.
- Ice cream, \$5.
- Bicycles and Musical instruments, \$10 to \$20.
- Dry goods, \$35.
- Engines and boilers, \$35.
- Express companies, \$100.
- Meat peddlers \$75 per quarter.
- Fish and vegetable peddlers, \$5.
- Insurance agents, \$50.
- Lunch counters, \$15.
- Wall paper, \$10.
- Opera houses, \$100.
- Produce or provisions by car load \$15 a car.
- Telephone companies, \$100.
- Undertakers, \$20.
- Merchants not mentioned, \$10.

The committee of which Geo. F. Smith is chairman meets this evening to consider the ordinance in detail.

GROSSE VS. GROSSE.

Papers Filed in a Divorce Suit Two Days After Marriage.

June 5th Georgia Comstock, of Salem, was married to Henry Grosse, of Polk county.

June 7th H. J. Bigger, as attorney, filed in the circuit court a petition for her divorce. It alleges that for forty-eight hours they had lived together as man and wife.

That in that time he had procured her arrest and imprisonment maliciously, accusing her of false pretense and Grosse fraud, and obtaining a deed of 100 acres of land in Nebraska, that she had been discharged from the criminal court, and that he had subjected her to personal indignity rendering life burdensome, etc.

Wherefore plaintiff demands a decree dissolving the bonds of matrimony with leave to resume her name as Comstock, and costs, etc, and such further relief as may be equitable.

CHOLERA.

Surgeon General Wyman, of the Marine hospital service, telegraphed the United minister at Constantinople, asking for affirmation or denial of the report that Cholera exists in that country and today received the following reply: The first case appeared on May 20th at Bagdad and it began spreading among the Arab settlements. Numerous cases are also reported and twenty deaths per diem at Bassorah. It has lately appeared at Red sea ports. (Signed) Newbury, Charge d'affaires." Dr. Wyman does not anticipate any danger from the disease unless it should work its way into Alexandria or the Red sea. Should it reach there great precaution will be necessary to prevent its admission into European countries.

THE HOP CROP COMING.

Uncle Dave Guthrie Fools the Spraying Machine Dealers.

Hop vines are spinning over the tops of the poles, growers are working day and night, sanguine of the biggest crop on record. The various spraying machine men have had a hard time selling Dave Guthrie of Polk county a hop-house exterminator. He refuses to believe his yards are lousy and the other day he played quite a trick on them.

Uncle Guthrie got a lot of black gnats and other little flies and the winged aphid and they declared those were the prolific female hop louse that could lay a million eggs a minute. But he only chuckled by himself and has not bought a sprayer yet, though he says he is not throwing off on spraying at all.

When the lice get a good ready and the weather is right they will be on hand. They won't have to be notified by the weather clerk. If the combination is just right they can ruin any hop yard in a few days.

The sprayer men are saying that the lice are coming on too slow to sell machines. Some say rainy, cool weather is good for lice; others say the sun is what breeds them. Uncle Dave says that it is in the shade that lice multiply. The sea breezes turn up the leaves of his hop orchard once a day and the lice don't get a foothold.

There is no doubt there is a good foundation for lice in the country and they will appear thick with half a chance. Better be ready for them.
