WILLAMETTE COMMENCEMENT

The Annual Meeting of the
Trustees.

RESIGNATIONS AND CHANGES MADE.

Essays, Orations, Flowers, Diplo-
mas and Graduation Exer-
cises.

The trustees met at 9 a. m. and trans-
acted the usual routine business.
Among the items of general interest
Gen. W. H. Odell was re-elected as
trustee. J. H. Albert resigned as sec-
retary and the election of his successor
has been postponed. Resignations of
Prof. Arnold and Cunningham were
read. Prof. Arnold has been in Will-
amette university for eleven years. He
has done most faithful service and has
been an unfailing and generous friend
of the school. Many students will rise
up to thank him for aiding them
through school. We are sorry to see
him go for we value his excellent qual-
ities as a man and a teacher. We hear
he has accepted a more favorable situ-
ation and we wish him continued suc-
cess. Prof. Cunningham has been a
teacher for nearly as long. She, too,
has worked faithfully and generously
and will be justly remembered. It is
said she is purposing what (a cycle
said it) all nice lady teachers do. May
prosperity, happiness and success at-
tend her continued good deeds.

At 3 p. m. the trustees adjourned to
attend the elocutionary contest. This
program always draws a large audience.
The exercises opened by a "Ladies'
Chorus" which was well rendered.
Prayer was offered by Rev. J. N. Den-
ison of St. Paul's church, Portland.

Miss Maggie Alderson rendered
"Dora Bella" by Loeschhorn in such a
way as to elicit the comment "She is
full of exquisite music." B. B. Barker
recited "The Unknown Speaker," and
Miss Ethel Hughes, "The Legend of
the Organ Builder." The vocal duet
by Mrs. Arthur Linn and Miss Scriber
received much praise. J. T. Burcham
recited "The Doom of Claudius and
Cynthia" and Miss Myrtle Marsh, "The
Daughter of Herodias." The selection
on mandolin and guitar by George F.
Rogers and Fred A. Reischer was
pretty harmony well executed. Wm.
A. Morris recited the "Battle of Ivry" and
Miss Helen L. Matthews "The
Swan Song." The piano solo by Miss
Genevieve Hughes "The Moment Mu-
sical," Moszkowska, displayed admi-
rable technique and expression. We
have purposely refrained from com-
menting severally on each speaker when
each one does so well, carefully express-
ing each thought and portraying each
emotion, measuring so nearly to a com-
mon standard, praise of one is the
praise of all. They did credit to them-
selves, to Prof. Scriber and to Willa-
mette University. We congratulate
them upon their excellent success and
look forward with anticipation to their
future development. The judges were
Dr. Bushong, of Portland, Dr. Gwynne,
of Salem, and Rev. J. T. Abbott, of Al-
bany; the result of their decision will be
announced Thursday morning. Prof.
Scriber has succeeded well this year
and is a most popular elocutionist both
at home and abroad.

The graduating exercises of the Uni-
versity academy and Normal class
opened at 8 p. m. by a grand piano
quartet, entitled "Kaiser March,"
which was written expressly for the
coronation of Kaiser Wilhelm, of Ger-
many, and rendered for the first time
in this part of the country, by Misses
Carpenter, Alderson, Sargeant and Mr.
Kruse. An impressive prayer was ut-
tered by Dr. F. H. Gwynne. Mattie
F. Beatty spoke on "The Governing
Purpose." The essay was excellent in
thought, carefully written and well
spoken. The essay was a credit to the
speaker. "The Symbolism of the
American Flag" was the topic chosen
by Edith G. Gwynne, B. S. D. The
discussion was full of careful historical
reminiscence, patriotic enthusiasm and
deserving thought. Miss Maggie Ald-
erson sang "Go Pretty Flower." Em-
ilie A. Henry, B. S. D., selected
"The New Education" as her subject.
She is a successful teacher and her es-
say showed wide reading and faithful
study. It prophesies a useful and dis-
tinguished work. Anson W. Prescott,
B. S. D. delivered his oration on
"America's Peril; Immigration." His
ideas were sound, the expression strong,
his information varied, the remedies
approved and the patriotism pro-
nounced. The oration is worthy of re-
petition. The piano solo, "Rhapsodie
Hungroise," No. 12, Franz List; by
Miss May Newsome, was deftly per-
formed. "The Gift of Language" was
the subject of the essay of by Elva M.
Spencer, B. S. D. It was an analyt-
ical production of much merit and care,
and was worthy of the preparation it
evinced. "The Proper Attitude of
Educators to the Liquor Question" was
Lydia B. Vandervort's essay. It was
a strong arraignment of the liquor
course. It showed the position of the
worthy educators. It was a beautiful
composition and evinced firm fiber and
useful power. Miss Nellie Carpenter

sang the vocal solo "The Knight was
Brave; Rosini—very pretty. The
last oration was delivered by John H.
Whitaker, on "America's peril; Political
corruption." The oration was clear
and forcible in thought, well prepared
and ably spoken. The speaker did well.

Rev. Mr. Hutchinson, pastor of the
Presbyterian church, presented the
class in a very pleasant and
earnest address. He spoke in re-
commendation of the efforts of the
graduating class and in portraying the
work before them became eloquent.
Dr. Whitaker then presented the diplo-
mas with deeply impressive words. The
essays and orations of the class were all
of a very high order. After a piano
duet by Misses Carpenter and Alderson
"Concert Gallop Brillante," Keltcher,
Dr. Danison pronounced the benedict-
tion.

The degree of B. S. D. (Bachelor of
Scientific Didactics) is the same one
conferred by all state schools on normal
graduates.
