BANKRUPT AUCTION SALE.—The bankrupt auction in Easton's music store is now running in full blast to crowded houses and will, without doubt, prove a complete success for the benefit of the creditors. THE SHOWS OVER.—The receipts of the Rose and Strawberry show were about \$150; expenses \$90. This will leave the Salem Floricultural Society a neat balance to work with next fall. All premiums will be paid in full. The ladies and gentlemen of the society have learned a great deal about running such a show. Heretofore the same shows have been conducted by the volunteers among the lovers of roses and growers of berries. There were several omissions in the Rose show, as for instance there were no large collections or artistic displays as heretofore. It was not known there was to be a strawberry show, as at first it was intended to have the flower show so early that strawberries would not have been ready. Then the date was changed twice and the strawberry men could not be organized. But it was excellent what there was.

SCHOOL CLOSURE.—Squirrel Hill school was out last Friday. The patrons of the school paid their respects by giving a big dinner and the school a good program and rendered it well. After the exercises the prizes were awarded as follows: Two \$5 prizes were given in penmanship to L. W. Edminister and C. C. Morris. Several minor prizes were also given. The teacher, W. D. Freeman, made a most sympathetic farewell address.

FRUIT MARKET.—This will be a crucial year to test fruit growing and marketing. Aumsville fruit growers are supplying immense quantities of strawberries to the Salem cannery. That is a great fruit growing center and will next year ship to consumers their own. They say they can get them to market fresher by one day.

RESIGNED.—The letter of resignation of Rev. Robt. Whitaker, of the First Baptist church, was read to his congregation Sunday evening. It will probably be acted upon at the Thursday evening prayer meeting. Rev. Whitaker expects to take a pulpit at Oakland, Cal.

HURT BY A HORSE.—R. F. Wingate, the Standard Sewing machine man, had a shoulder dislocated Sunday at noon by his carriage horse rearing up and striking him a severe blow. He will be confined for some time.

THE ANNUAL INSTITUTE.

Marion County Teachers Will Assemble at Salem for Two Weeks.

County Supt. Graham has set July 10th as the date for the teachers institute. Prof. Ackerman and Wetzel, of Portland, and W. I. Staley, principal of the Capital City Business College will assist as department instructors. Prof. Graham has sent out to all teachers, and will send to any one intending to attend, a circular giving complete information, course of study, time of sessions, etc., for \$1.00.

The institute will be conducted in three divisions with occasional joint sessions. The first division will be composed of those persons desiring to take the examination this year for State Diploma and the work will be a review of the branches required in that examination; namely: Composition, physical geography and book-keeping.

The second division will be given methods of instruction in class and professional work. The third division will take up a course of study leading to the requirements for country examinations. This will be strictly academic and a careful review of the common school branches will be conducted through the entire session.

FIRE AT LINCOLN.—The sawmill, planing mill and bee-hive factory at Lincoln, Polk county, was destroyed by fire early Sunday morning. It is a total loss. No insurance. There had been no fire in the building for several days, and it was probably the work of incendiaries.

PRESENTATION.—The scholars and teachers of North Salem schools on Friday evening presented Jos. A. Sellwood, the retiring principal with a fine easy chair, valued at about ten dollars. It is more highly prized as a kind token from those whom Mr. Sellwood has so long and faithfully served.

THE HUMANE SOCIETY PRIZES.

Spirited Contests at the Opera House Before a Refined Audience.

At 8 p. m.: Saturday evening a most refined audience was assembled at Reed's opera house to hear the public school children declaim and read essays on the subject of kindness to animals. The opera house would have been crowded but for the Rose show and that the people had been attending school exercises for a week. On the platform were Rev. Copeland, of Unity church, Supt. Downing, City Supt. Grubbe, Secretary Miss Hall, Mrs. J. L. Parrish, Mrs. E. M. Waite, Mrs. Wm. Englund, Mrs. J. B. Stump, and about a dozen school children. Miss Weller played a selection on the piano from Raff, "La Traviata." It was loudly applauded. Rev. Copeland spoke briefly on the organization of the American Humane society by Henry Bergh, of New York and its work.

He showed great interest in this work of preventing cruelty to animals and gave those present some exceedingly good thoughts to ponder over.

Mrs. Leona Willis Piper, always a popular and cultured vocalist at Salem, sang the "Spring Song" from Well. She was accompanied by Mrs. W. Denton. After this City Supt. Grubbe delivered a brief address on the work in the schools. She stated that every pupil in every room in all the schools of the city had learned a declamation or written an essay on the subject of kindness to animals.

THE ESSAY PRIZES. The essays were exceeding good. Ralph Watson's original story of a dog "Caleb," who has a monument erected in honor of his memory in Oregon, was given the first prize of \$5.00. The second prize of \$2.50 was given to an essay reviewing the Humane society work conducted by Mr. Angell of Boston, the author being Pearl Wickstrom of the North school. It was read by Mr. Copeland.

THE RECITATIONS. Oscar Muellerhaupt, of East school, Maud Griswold, of the Park, Dora Mason, of the Lincoln, Robert McCarl, of the North, Nettie Beckner, of the Central, Grace Davis, of the Lincoln, Bertha Clough, the North, Chas. Miller, the Park, Jas. Mott, the Central, and Nina Bushnell, of the East.

The little children were all marked perfect by the judges in memorizing and pronunciation of their pieces and scored very high on five points of importance in declaiming. This shows that children lose the use of their voices to a great extent by our present method of education as they grow older, as few mature young men and women can make themselves perfectly understood. While awaiting award of the committee Supt. Downing made a brief and appropriate address on the subject of kindness to animals. He was introduced as the generous friend of "Old Calamity," he having taken that starved animal off the hands of the Humane society, and restored her wasted and maltreated form to the fullness of plenty in his pasture and barn with free care and feed. Judge B. F. Bonham was detained at home by company.

THE SPEAKING PRIZES.

The judges consisted of Mrs. J. L. Parrish, Rev. Copeland, of Unity church, and E. Hofer. They fixed the scoring of each contestant on the memorizing, pronunciation, gesture, expression, and appropriateness of selection, the points running from one to ten. The result of their conclusions was that \$5, the first prize in declamation, was due to Master James Mott, son of Dr. W. S. Mott, who recited, "Died in the Harness," written by Jas. Boyle O'Reilly. (This beautiful poem was first read by the Irish poet, who died two years ago, at the annual meeting of the Boston Humane society in 1879. Wendell Phillips presiding and James Freeman Clarke making the address.)

DIED IN THE HARNESS.

Only a fallen horse stretched out there on the road, Stretched in the broken shafts and crushed by the heavy load.

Only a fallen horse and a circle of wondering eyes— Watching the frightened teamster goading his beast to rise.

Hold, for his trial is over; no more labor for him. See, the poor neck outstretched and the patient eyes grow dim.

After the weary journey how restful it is to lie— With the broken shafts and the cruel load, waiting only to die.

Watchers, he died in the harness, died in the shafts and straps. Fell, and the burden killed him, one of the day's mishaps.

Passers crowding the pathway staying four steps a while— What is the symbol, only death—why should we cease to smile

At death for a beast of burden? On through the busy street, That is ever and ever echoing the tread of the hurrying feet.

What was the sign? a symbol to teach the tireless will. Does he who spoke in parables teach in parables still?

The seed sown on the rock is wasted in the heedless hearts of men, That gather and sow and reap and lose labor and sleep, and then—

Then for the prize, a crowd in the street of ever echoing tread. The toiler, crushed by the heavy load, is there, in the harness, dead.

JAS. BOYLE O'REILLY.

This young orator was marked ten plus on every point, and certainly deserved it. He had at his side a crayon drawing of the fallen carthorse, lying on the pavement with his cruel master goading him to arise. Master Mott is a promising young orator. The second prize of \$2.50 was awarded to little Nina Bushnell, a pupil in Miss Allena Melan's room at East school, the subject being "Shirley and the Kittens." Her marking was forty-eight.

Nettie Beckner in "The Baby Robin's Cry," and Grace Davis in "The Wilted in Heaven," both scored forty-six and the committee regretted not having prizes to award them.

Chas. Miller who recited the story of the old fire department horse elicited applause and laughter and spoke very finely. It is expected that the Humane society can arrange to give prizes again next year when perhaps more prizes and larger ones can be offered.

Everyone present declared that it was the finest entertainment of the week, not excepting any college or graduating program and Rev. Copeland in his Sunday morning service declared that the evening's work was "better than a sermon on any problem of theology ten hours long."
