THE ALBANY BANKS.—The Democrat: The bank inspector was telegraphed. On his arrival a receiver will be appointed and the bank placed under his control. Depositors will be paid per centages as fast as securities are paid. The Bank of Oregon closed its doors and placed out the sign, "Closed by order of the directors." The assets are paid to exceed the liabilities, and depositors will probably be paid in full on realization on securities. The Lebanon bank, connected with the Linn County bank, closed its doors.

Lynde of East Portland, who has been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sauvain, of East Salem for the past week, received a letter yesterday noon from her husband, saying "come on first train, our home was burned Friday night, and nothing was saved from the flames." This is indeed a sad blow to a young couple during the first year of married life, to lose their all in a few hours. Their house and furniture was valued at \$2000, and it was not insured.

OFF THE STREET.—A movement is on foot to take the "bikes" off the street. The proposition to put down a half mile bicycle track on Willson avenue will come up in the city council tonight. It can be done without hurting the avenue and whenever it is improved the track will not be in the way.

AT THE CANNERY.—Seven tons of strawberries were taken in at the cannery yesterday. Only the best fruit is being put up, and a can opened last night showed the product was in the most perfect condition. The cannery continues to receive all that come, only rejecting large soft fruit.

BURAWAY.—A Fourth of July crowd ran out onto Commercial street at 12:40 today to see heavy bay team hitched to a lumber wagon go tearing south across the viaduct and over the hill. It was a fair race along the wide smooth street and they had clear sailing, stopping in an exhausted condition near Judge Lord's residence in South Salem.

CORNS.—Spring sown grains have improved wonderfully the past few weeks, with cool weather and showers. Fall sown would have matured more perfectly with hotter dryer weather. The general estimate is that everything is about as well off as could be.

WOMAN'S RACE.—At the fair grounds the last day of the July races will occur a novelty in the shape of a woman's horse race. It will consist of a continuous six mile race on horseback. The ladies will change horses every trip around the course, and it promises to be one of the most exciting events of the racing season. Two entries have already been made, Miss Daisy Biers, of Salem, and Miss Bertha Price of Turner. More are coming in, and it is expected that no less than a dozen ladies will start in the race.

SMALL FIRE.—There was a small fire in the city this forenoon. The fire department was not called out and losses are covered by insurance. The loss is about \$300 on contents, \$100 on house. There was no alarm, the neighbors putting out the flames which caught from a defective flue. It was the Arthur Glover house, on High street, near corner of Union, occupied by L. Tolpolar.

"We are having a h-l of a nice time getting down to a gold basis. Some of the gold-bug fools will learn only in the dear school of experience. The people know there is not gold enough in the country for business necessities. If we had a free silver courage man for president it would be different."

THE VALUED POLICY LAW.

Ten Per Cent Raise Ordered by Insurance Companies.

It will be remembered that THE JOURNAL opposed the valued policy insurance law that passed the legislature last winter. It was then predicted insurance rates would be advanced as a result. But others thought not and now it comes to pass that all premiums on building risks are ordered advanced ten per cent.

WHAT INSURANCE MEN SAY. A prominent Salem insurance broker said today:

"Owing to the valued policy law that was passed by the last legislature, the compact has instructed all agents to add 10 per cent to all premiums on building risks. This is how legislatures think that they are sinching Insurance Co.'s. It looks all well enough until the insured has his premium to pay. It is said that a Salem man got up the law and worked it through the legislature. Be this as it may, the insured has got the bill to foot, and the Insurance Co. will make a nice little clean up in the operation."

MITCHELL, WRIGHT & CO. "It is a fact and takes effect July 1st, on all building policies written on and after that date. It will amount to a large sum in this state. It will cost nearly \$100,000 a year. While personally we took no hand for or against the valued policy law, we felt that it was against the interest of the people. In our experience since 1889 we have paid many losses and have never sealed a loss. If a risk is honestly written there is never any trouble in securing honest and actual indemnity from an honest company and that is all we handle."

An old insurance man says: "It will result in some companies withdrawing from this state, and prevent others coming here to do insurance."

MANAGER COTTLE of the State Insurance Co. of Salem says the order was issued by the Pacific Insurance Union and that all companies will have to comply. He estimated that the total raise would not be over \$35,000 or \$40,000 on a year's business in Oregon. The companies would have to raise the rates at least ten per cent anyhow as the fire loss will be increased more than that, as soon as the law comes to be generally understood."

GEORGE M. BEELER. "There is no good reason for it—but I judge the people will be willing to pay a little more and know just what they will get in case of loss. As a whole the people will not pay more on the ten per cent increase than they have formerly lost by unscrupulous managers paying but a portion of their policies."
