WEATHER FORECAST.—Friday, clearing, cooler.

WASOM HELD.—Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Wyatt returned from Harrisburg, where he had been to prosecute Dung Wasom, on the charge of assault and attempt to kill with a dangerous weapon. Wasom was held under \$1200 bonds to await the action of the grand jury which was promptly furnished. The facts seem to be that R. L. White was talking to Mrs. Wasom in front of her home. Wasom came out, and White claims, without warning or provocation, began stabbing him, and then shot at him four times. Wasom claims that White had been interfering with his family affairs. It was no doubt at least a case of jealousy. White was stabbed once very close to the jugular vein, once in the arm and twice elsewhere. He will probably live.—Albany Democrat.

THE CITY HALL.—The committee say they will be prepared to report to the city council Friday evening in favor of a plan and adoption of one of the bids. They intend the completed building shall cost not over \$75,000 and basement and first floor with plumbing and heating to be finished within this year and building enclosed. It looks now as tho' the work would go right ahead. The first floor will contain jail, fire department quarters and city offices. The street will be nicely improved all around the building and cement walks put down.

SOUTHERN OREGON.—Hon. H. R. Miller of Grants Pass was in the city today. He says a hundred per cent. more gold is being taken out of the ground there than ever before. The watermelon and vegetable crop is late and not assured. Peaches will be a half crop. More will be shipped from there than ever before. The quality on the hill lands will be fine. HON. L. O. GRIFFITH INJURED.

Struck by an Electric Car While Trying to Cross the Track.

At nearly twelve o'clock today Hon. Lewis C. Griffith, a wealthy pioneer farmer of the Waldo Hills, was run into by an electric car while trying to drive across the track on South Commercial street. The buggy was wrecked completely and his team of fine horses broke loose and ran away.

THE WRECK.

The buggy was torn in two, the running gear badly smashed, and thrown nearly fifty feet beyond where it struck. The top was torn off and Mr. Griffith was found doubled up in it when he was picked up by his wife and others. He was not insensible but severely shaken up and stunned. He was carried into Mr. Scriber's residence at 1 p. m. was resting quite easily. For a man of his age, nearly 70, it was a terrible experience.

HOW IT HAPPENED.

The car was coming south on the noon trip in charge of Sam Sauvain. S. T. Maxwell was on the car, as helper. Eye witnesses were Isaac Conklin and Mrs. Mary C. Jory. As the car approached Kearney street this side of Mr. Scriber's residence, Mr. Griffith turned short to cross over the track and the team and buggy were almost over when the car struck him. The men say it was running at only a moderate rate of speed.

THE INJURED MAN

He is Lewis C. Griffith, the father of Dr. L. F. Griffith, Mrs. S. G. Grubbe, Dr. J. C. Griffith, Mrs. L. H. McMahon, all of Salem. Two of his sons were immediately at his side with medical attendance.

Mr. Griffith was returning from Monmouth Normal school and had just let his wife out at C. W. Scriber's residence, while he started to drive around to the barn with his team when the accident happened.

The team was found near the Reform school. One of the horses is cut some and lame.

THE INJURIES

Upon examination it was found that Mr. Griffith has a collar bone broken and also a rib.

OPENING OF THE FAIR GROUNDS.

An Opportunity to See What Has Been Done—The Band Will Play.

The state agricultural society have this year spent more money on improvements than during any previous year in its history. Over \$10,000 will have been spent, exclusive of the fine new regulation track just being completed. The new grand stand will be a magnificent structure, 280x50 feet, over half of which will be completed before the coming races. The new track, which has been built, costs about \$1,500, taken from the society's funds and not from the state appropriation.

The citizens of Salem will be surprised at the wonderful transformation which has taken place. Over sixty men and thirty-five teams have been working on the grounds for a month and some excellent improvements all around are the result. The new grand stand when completed will be one of the finest on the northwest coast. Before the races come off, all Salem should see it, and it is now proposed to give a free band concert on these Saturday evening, July 1st, when everything will be thrown open for public inspection. A pleasant time can be had, and no doubt thousands will take advantage of the opportunity. At this season of the year the grounds are in almost perfect condition, and make a delightful resort to spend a pleasant evening.
