OLD CALIFORNIAN DIES.

Found Dead in the Midst of his Daily Labor.

The earthly life of one of the best men on the Pacific coast ended suddenly in the midst of his labors Monday evening. It was very sudden and unexpected.

John Chauncey, a resident of South Salem, was engaged in cultivating some land on the Levy farm about three and a half miles southwest of Salem. He left home early in the day as was his industrious habit. In the heat of spirits and was in good health up to the time of his death, about 4:15 o'clock in the afternoon.

He was engaged in cultivating along with his son, Charles. The father drove his team to a well, a distance of 200 yards, to unhitch and water the horses. About an hour later the son went to the well to get a drink of water and discovered his father lying on the ground dead, the team standing at the well unhitched. He at once notified others to remain with the body and hastened to the city and notified the coroner who designated Judge Batchelor to proceed with the inquest which was done this forenoon, and reported according to the facts, the body was brought to the home at 10 o'clock last evening.

John Chauncey was born in Hartford, Connecticut, August 15, 1829. He came to California in 1852 by the way of Cape Horn, and was an experienced miner and was one of the first to cultivate the lands in the San Joaquin valley. He resided at Stockton until five years ago when he came to Salem. He leaves a wife and three children—a son, Charles, and two daughters, Mrs. J. A. McCarl and Mrs. Grace Peterman of Byron, Contra Costa county, California.

John Chauncey was a member of the sect of Christadelphians, who meet regularly among themselves for study of scripture. He leaves no property but what he has distributed among his children and disposed of. His son Charles will carry on his business as vegetable gardener. His physician and has for some time been treating him for heart disease.

The funeral was held at 3 o'clock today, Tuesday, from the residence at South Salem. There was no religious service, deceased belonging to no church. The remains were conveyed to the cemetery by a Capital City Electric funeral car. His friends paid him many tributes of respect with flowers and kindly inquiry. Stockton papers please copy.

John Chauncey was a hard working honest man. He was very kind-hearted and liked by all who knew him. His character was formed on the lines of perfect integrity. He was tolerant in all good ways and intolerant only of evil in any form. There is assuredly a better existence in store for such. But he was faithful here.

Driving Milch Cows.

The other day I saw a small boy on a small black pony, driving two cows from pasture at breakneck speed. Watch the boy that drives your cows to and from the pasture. It is a miserable bad practice to run a milch cow. Of all animals, she more than another, needs to be slowly driven and kindly treated. Driving the cow at an unwonted gait will result in less milk, and the milk will decrease wonderfully in cream richness, and is liable to be poisoned by fever from the cow, brought on by undue exertion and nervous excitement. It is not safe to feed such milk to little children.—Edwin Montgomery in Hoard's Dairyman.

Longfellow's Maine House.

There are few places of interest in Maine that attract greater attention than the "Longfellow house" in Portland, which was recently presented to the Maine Historical society by Mrs. Anne L. Pierce, a sister of the poet. It was the first brick house erected in Portland, having been built by General Peleg Wadsworth, adjutant general of Massachusetts during the Revolution.

General Wadsworth was second in command during the unsuccessful conflict with an English fleet which arrived at Penobscot bay during the summer of 1779. It was shortly afterward that his house at Camden was entered at midnight, and he was taken prisoner. The general established himself in Portland during the spring of 1774 and in the following year began the erection of the now historic house. The bricks were brought from Philadelphia, and over two years elapsed before the house was completed.

Stephen Longfellow, father of the poet, married a daughter of General Wadsworth. Mrs. Longfellow, mother of Mrs. Pierce, had eight children—four daughters and four sons. With the exception of the eldest child and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow all the children were born in the old homestead that was given to the Maine Historical society. It was only by the merest accident that Henry W. was not born in the same house. According to Mrs. Pierce, the house was undergoing repairs, and while the changes were being made a small house at the corner of Fore and Hancock streets owned by Captain Stephenson was occupied. This house was burned.—Cor. New York Tribune.
