LOOTING LANE COUNTY.—That is what Sheriff Noland is charged with by the Farmer's committee of Lane county, who have examined the books and brought suit to recover the stealings.

The Eugene Guard says: "This afternoon at 2:30 o'clock the grange- alliance committee filed their complaint against Sheriff Noland.
