FRATERNAL ORDERS.

What is Doing in Some of the Orders Strongly Represented at Salem.

Chicago Tribune, Sept. 21: The eighty-first annual session of the Supreme Council 33d Degree Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, will long be remembered by members in attendance. Since Monday, when the great men of the Masonic fraternity who have been chosen to wear the combined star and cross within the mystic circle began to gather in Chicago, they found themselves in the hands of the brethren of the Oriental Consistory, S. P. R. S. 32d degree. With luncheons at the Temple and coach rides in the park the business sessions have been pleasantly interspersed. Last night the crowning event occurred at Kinsley's, when the visiting brethren were banqueted by the Orientals.

Covers were laid for 300, and there were no vacant chairs about the flower decked tables. Most of those present were elderly men, the chosen of the order. To attain the 33d degree requires years of Masonic effort. To receive the degree the candidate must be selected annually in the proportion of one to every hundred members of the 32d degree. To secure a seat in the Supreme Council is to maintain it for life, and such were the majority at last night's banquet.

This meeting of the Supreme Council of the Ancient Order of Accepted Masons will be long remembered in the annals of Masonry. It was called in Chicago this year especially as world's fair session for the purpose of uniting as many as possible of the representatives of the various supreme councils of the world. Representatives have been present from fifteen different supreme councils, there being one supreme council in each country of the world, except in the United States where there are two. The principal business was in considering matters proposed by the supreme councils of the world regarding a closer union and a more general exchange of representation between the various supreme councils abroad, where the rite is not as strong as it is in this country. These propositions have been put in form and will be presented at the next annual session which will be held in Boston in 1894.
