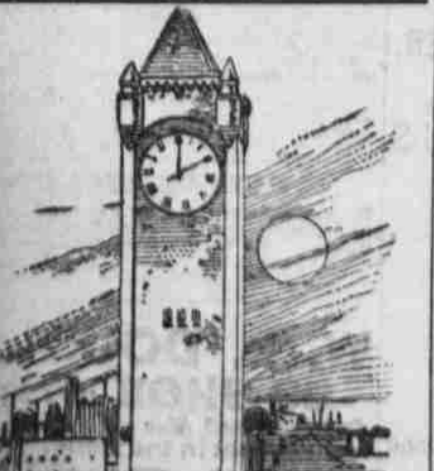

DEATH OF MISS CAPWELL.

Salem loses a Prominent Member of the Educational Profession.

It was known yesterday that Miss Olive M. Capwell, assistant principal of the Lincoln school of this city, was to have a difficult surgical operation performed for removal of a tumor.

Her many friends lived through a day of greatest anxiety, ending in the terrible shock caused by the news of her death at half past three.

The news of Miss Capwell's death soon spread over the city and there was a constant stream of inquiring friends tendering sympathy to her bereaved mother who only recently came out from Iowa to make her home with her.

SKETCH OF MISS CAPWELL.

Olive M. Capwell was born in Wyoming, Wyoming county, New York, in 1851, and at the age of 7 years went to Monroe, Wis., with her parents.

Later she resigned the position and became one of the teachers in the Salem public schools. Miss Capwell was chosen vice president of the Salem Teachers' Association.

Olive Capwell was a very conscientious teacher. Refined, intelligent and kind hearted; her soul seemed adapted to the work of drawing out the children, bringing them close to her and making them love her.

The funeral of Miss Capwell will probably take place Thursday, awaiting a brother of deceased from Boise City who is expected to arrive.
