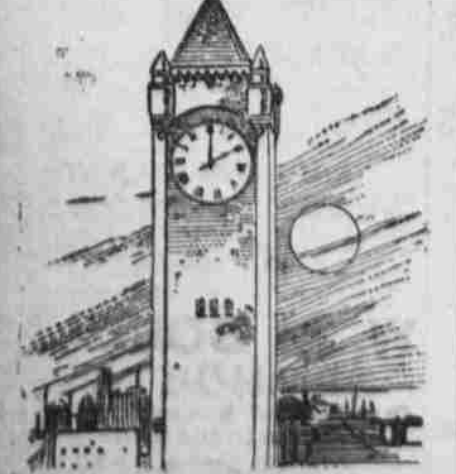

CONGREGATIONAL SESSION: The State Association Proceedings and Labors.

The 45th session of the state association of Congregational churches reassembled at the first church in Portland Wednesday morning, after the preliminary session the evening before.

A temporary organization was effected by the election of Rev. F. W. Parker, of Woodlawn, moderator, and Rev. H. W. Young, clerk. The committee on permanent organization reported the following permanent officers, which were made the unanimous choice of the body: Moderator, Professor H. Allen Shorey; clerk, Rev. W. C. Kantner, of Corvallis; assistant clerk, Rev. H. W. Young.

The report of the committee on Christian endeavor was read by Rev. F. E. Cook, and adopted. Rev. D. V. Polting read a paper on the subject of "Our Churches and Their Young People." Rev. Dr. J. K. MacLean, of Oakland, Cal., delivered an address on the subject of "Our Churches and Higher Education."
