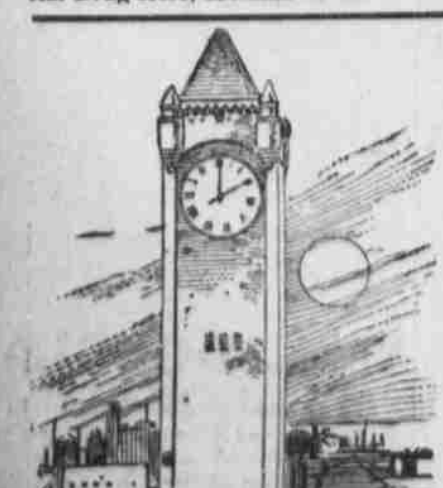
THE ALTONA.—This boat went down today with 20 passengers and a good load of freight in spite of heavy fog. She may lay over here Sundays in future.
