## PENNOTER ON THE DEFENSIVE.

The statesman and the Oregonian treat lightly Governor Penney's setting of a day of his own, for which there is neither law, custom nor justification, as Thanksgiving day. They seem to class it as a joke that this state is to be made ridiculous and the people put to unusual trouble and expense by having two legal holidays to observe. The governor offers in his own behalf no first-class authority. He cites one newspaper almanac and a patent medicine almanac and an encyclopedia. The objection to the governor's action is not so much to the day, though that is a piece of folly, as it is to the political character of his message. Not that his politics are objectionable, but that he should have introduced any political whatever upon a sacred occasion and that he should have taken advantage of his position to vent his spleen against a personal and political enemy on a day of peace, fraternity and harmony, and have sought to compel all the people to join with him in that course.

That was wrong, eternally wrong, and no amount of newspaper mollycoddling will gloss it over. The people have some rights which those in high office must respect and chief among those rights are the common courtesies and decencies of life. These Governor Penney has outraged on this occasion in a very silly and foolish manner for which no man can defend him or respect him, be he or he not a Clevelandite, or Penneyite, so long as he pretends to be civilized.

If the governor would say he had made an error, as even high officials are said to err at times, it would be different. But as long as he glories in his action and seeks to be advertised thereby and feels proud of it, the case is different. No one ever censured President Cleveland more severely than he for going fishing on Memorial day. No one would denounce Cleveland more bitterly than he were the president to introduce his peculiar political views into his Thanksgiving day proclamation. But Governor Penney thinks he is a law unto himself. He imagines he can do what he would himself denounce in others and escape condemnation. The people can make no such distinctions. They feel that the governor has unfairly and improperly made use of an occasion to fling mud at a political opponent at the expense of the dignity of his high office and the power entrusted by them.

## IN MEMORY OF LUCY STONE.

The funeral services held in Boston, Oct. 21st, in memory of Lucy Stone, were attended by more than 1100 people. The church was crowded and people stood in the streets in honor of the foremost champion of female suffrage of the United States, so recently passed away. The coffin was almost buried in flowers, and Mrs. Stone face surrounded by the familiar lace cap she wore so much looked peaceful, serene and lovely as in life. Among the floral tributes was a garland of seventy-five roses, one for each year of her life. The predominating flowers were yellow and white. The colors of the cause she loved better than life.

Rev. Charles G. Ames and others delivered appropriate addresses. A few days before the close of her eventful career she said, "Let my funeral be simple and cheerful," and added: "I believe there is work for me to do where I am going." Work was the essence of her religion, unselfish work for others. Her faith was founded in a spirit of trust expressed in the lines of Whittier:

I know not what the future hath Of travail or surprise, Assured alone that life and death His mercy underlies.

I know not where His islands lift Their crowded palms in air, I only know I cannot drift Beyond life love and care.

And so, beside the silent sea, I wait theuffled oar, No harm from Him can come to me On ocean or on shore.

Mrs. Stone was a woman gifted with great forces as an inspirer and as a worker. She was a strong minded woman in the highest sense of the word. Mrs. Livermore said of her once: "When her mind was made up, all the world and the Almighty on top of it couldn't have made her budge one inch. But then, she might be always on her side. She had a passion for justice."

The Woman's Journal, founded by Lucy Stone, and of which she was editor for more than twenty years, devotes its entire issue of Oct. 23rd to reviewing her life work and in it tributes to her character. Not a word is misapplied in eulogy of one of America's noblest and bravest heroines.

## A NEW PARTY.

A new element in American politics is cropping up in the Eastern states; and it is one which promises to divide the people on a stronger line than either the tariff or the silver question.

For many years an organization, known to the world as the "A. P. A." has been quietly growing and extending to boundaries and influence from its headquarters in Philadelphia; and it is, not without great show of probability, claimed that its enrolment today, includes a million of men, chiefly located east of the Mississippi and north of Mason and Dixon's line. An offshoot of the order of Orangemen of Great Britain it formerly declared itself as the American Protestant Association and so it was designated by its weekly and monthly organs in Philadelphia and New York; but, latterly, it appears under the title of the American Protective Association. To some extent this later appellation is misleading for it suggests to the uninitiated a combine against free trade; though in reality it is interpreted in the spirit of old-time Know Nothingism, and is held to indicate simply its pure American tendency.

The A. P. A. is, however, (first, last, and all the time) an anti-Romanist in situation, and, naturally enough, it has become most vigorously prominent in that ancient home of Puritanism, Massachusetts, where it has grown to be already an important factor in state politics, and, next year, is expected to carry the local elections everywhere outside of South Boston. Its sudden and startling force and publicity, just now, is attributed to the official reception in Washington of the Papal Ambassador, Satolli, a diplomatic condition hitherto unknown in the United States.

Not alone this, but the attitude assumed by the Roman Catholic hierarchy on the school question, and the dictation of the church in political matters have alarmed and armed the descendants of the men who landed at Plymouth Rock, and the diverse classes, who "sympathize" with the remonstrants against ecclesiastical interference in state matters. The association declares itself as not arrayed against theology but against theocracy; not against Roman Catholics, but against clerical dominance and dictation. Its members are not Protestants per se, for thousands of them profess no religious affiliations whatever; and the tenets of the society would apply equally to Episcopalianism, Methodism, Presbyterianism, or any other "ism" which might seek to put the church ahead of the state in purely mundane affairs. Its antagonism is especially invoked against interference with the common school system, entirely unsectarian and sought to be made compulsory in the interest of the public weal alone; and against the hierarchical control of vast sums of money, whose colossal proportions are yearly swelling, and which may so easily be made an engine for the subversion of popular liberty.

It is sought to spread as silently and as swiftly as possible, the tenets of a political party, which shall dominate federal as well as state politics; and, in the near future, control congress and furnish an occupant for the white house.

It is undeniable that a church and state party has made great progress in our country, and this political party is its highest manifestation so far. We shall observe its movements with great interest.
