SUPREME COURT.

The decision of Chief Justice W. P. Lord is of interest to every city interested in street improvements. It sets at rest the question of a city council's power to assess property and collect taxes.

M. S. Warren, respondent, vs. M. C. Crosby et al., appeal from Clatsop county; judgment affirmed. Opinion by Lord C. J. The court held that the general law passed at the last session of the legislature providing for "a more convenient mode of making assessments and collecting taxes" had the effect to repeal the provisions of the Astoria charter investing the common council of that city with power to assess property and collect taxes for municipal purposes. Under the provisions of the general act the power of the city in reference to taxation is confined to the levy, the assessment and collection of the city taxes now devolves upon the county officers.

The decision of the court in state vs. Wright, 14 Oregon 365 so far as it conflicts with the opinion herein is overruled.

Ordered that the Portland Bridge case be docketed for trial at this term at an early day.

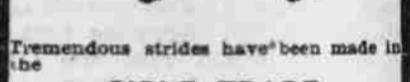
